



## Bishop Malesic leaving with 'great joy' but 'heavy heart'

**GREENSBURG** — Bishop Edward C. Malesic said farewell to the Diocese of Greensburg in an Aug. 30 Mass from Blessed Sacrament Cathedral, noting that he goes to Cleveland with great joy but a heavy heart at leaving what has been his home for five years.

The farewell Mass showed all the signs of the current restrictions to combat the spread of COVID-19. Instead of a cathedral overflowing with well-wishers, a limited number of people were in attendance, all wearing face coverings and maintaining social distancing.

The guests included people who were selected to represent their respective parishes, approximately 20 clergy and leaders from local religious communities, including the recently elected Benedictine Archabbot Martin Bartel from Saint Vincent Archabbey, Latrobe.

"I hate to say it, but the time has come to say goodbye," Bishop Malesic said to open his homily. "Following the Lord sometimes takes us to places that were not part of our original travel plans."

He could only say "yes" when he heard Pope Francis had appointed him the next bishop of Cleveland, Bishop Malesic said, but did so with a "heavy heart."

He said he is excited about going to Cleveland and goes to them with great joy.

"The heavy heart comes from having to say goodbye to a diocese that I have called home and made my home for these past five years, and to bid farewell to people I have come to know as my friends," he said.

Bishop Malesic noted the challenges he and the diocese have faced together over the past five years — the opioid crisis, the clergy abuse crisis and the ongoing coronavirus pandemic.

"It has been a tough five years, for sure," he said. "But I think we can all hold our heads up high as members of the Diocese of Greensburg, because we have kept the faith."

He expressed his gratitude for the support and prayers of the people of the diocese and the chances to worship with people, administer the sacrament of confirmation and celebrate anniversaries.

He especially enjoyed the fish fries and summer festivals, Bishop Malesic said.

He encouraged people to continue communicating the Gospel message of Jesus Christ, promoting vocations and solidarity.

Solidarity means, he said, "Loving each other, appreciating each other, building each other up, and understanding that when one part of the body is hurting all of us are hurting.

"We need to understand our connectedness to each other as brothers and sisters in the Lord. If we understood this as a community, all barriers would be torn down, racism would end, strangers would be welcomed to our country, the unborn would be protected and justice would lead to peace."

He ended with the closing from the "The Carol Burnett Show," singing, "I'm so glad we had this time together.

"It includes the line," he said, "Seems we just get started and before you know it, comes the time have to say, 'So long.'

"Today, that is my sentiment, too."



## Msgr. Kulick elected administrator

GREENSBURG — Msgr. Larry J. Kulick, moderator of the curia and a priest of the diocese for 28 years, was elected administrator of the Diocese of Greensburg by the College of

Consultors Sept. 15. The election was held one day after Bishop Edward C. Malesic was installed as the 12th bishop of the Diocese of Cleveland.

Msgr. Kulick, who is also pastor of St. James Parish, New Alexandria, will oversee the governance of the Diocese of Greensburg until a new bishop is appointed by Pope Francis.

Msgr. Kulick, who served as vicar general of the diocese for Bishop Malesic, will be responsible for the governance of the day-to-day activities of the diocese to ensure that the work, ministry and mission of the diocese continue. He will act as a steward of the diocese and its patrimony until a new bishop assumes these responsibilities.

One of the important obligations of the administrator, Msgr. Kulick said, will be to prepare the

diocese to receive its new bishop. The authority of the diocesan administrator is

limited and does not equal that of the diocesan bishop, he said. The administrator cannot, for ex-

ample, institute nor promulgate any new diocesan policies.

Msgr. Kulick is a native of Leechburg, where he was a parishioner of the former St. Martha Parish. He holds a bachelor's degree in philosophy from Saint Vincent College, and a master's degree in systematic theology and a master of divinity degree from Saint Vincent Seminary, both in Latrobe. He was ordained to the priesthood May 16, 1992, by Bishop Anthony G. Bosco at Blessed Sacrament Cathedral, Greensburg.

He earned a licentiate in canon law from The Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., in 2012.

Msgr. Kulick was appointed vicar general and moderator of the curia in 2012 by Bishop Lawrence E. Brandt and reappointed vicar general in 2015 by Bishop Malesic.

He received the title of monsignor by virtue of his office as vicar general of the diocese May 21, 2014.

## Bishop Malesic welcomed to Diocese of Cleveland

**CLEVELAND** — Guests attending the installation of Bishop Edward C. Malesic as the 12th Bishop of the Diocese of Cleveland Sept. 14 were given red masks as they entered the Cathedral of

St. John the Evangelist. Red is the liturgical color of the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, celebrated that day.

The masks were also an illustration of how the Catholic Church perseveres during COVID-19. Despite the limited number of guests who were seated three rows apart, Bishop Malesic said his heart was joyful.

"I woke up as Bishop of Greensburg and will go to sleep the Bishop of Cleveland," Bishop Malesic said.

He was formally welcomed to his cathedral church by Archbishop Christophe Pierre, apostolic nuncio to the U.S. Also in attendance were retired Benedictine Archabbot Douglas Nowicki of Saint Vincent Archabbey, Latrobe; Bishop Lawrence T. Persico of the Diocese of Erie; Bishop Ronald W. Gainer of the Diocese of Harrisburg; and Archbishop Nelson J. Perez of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, who preceded Bishop Malesic as head of Cleveland diocese.

During the Mass, representatives of the Diocese of Cleveland's College of Consultors, the Presbyteral Council, deacons, religious men and women, and staff were presented to Bishop Malesic.

They were part of a small crowd who filled the cathedral with roaring applause when Bishop Malesic was officially installed.

During his homily, he told the crowd he remembers when he was informed by the apostolic nuncio that Pope Francis appointed him Bishop of Cleveland.





"I remember saying, 'It's cold there!" Bishop Malesic said. "Anyone who knows me knows I prefer palm trees over pine trees," he said. "But as a missionary disciple of Jesus Christ, I said yes, and I'm glad I did. I am happy to be here with all of you today."

He addressed the resolve of the Church during the pandemic.

"I look at this socially distant congregation and I know the Holy Spirit is still

"I hope to become your brother," Bishop Malesic said.

"We will carry the cross of COVID-19 together. After this pandemic, our church needs to rise again."

# Seminarian, Clergy Formation Collection to be taken in parishes Sept. 26-27

**GREENSBURG** — The annual Seminarian and Clergy Formation Collection to support seminarians, priests, permanent deacons and international priests in the diocese will be held the weekend of Sept. 26-27 under the intercession of Mary, Queen of Clergy.


In a letter to parishioners of the diocese, Father Tyler J. Bandura, director of the Office for Priestly Vocations, asked them to help continue the momentum started by Bishop Edward C. Malesic, who made vocations a priority during the five years he led the diocese.

Father Bandura said part of that effort has included working with clergy and laity to create a "Culture of Vocations" in the parishes. The priests attended a two-day workshop on promoting vocations in the parish community, then were asked to identify a core team in the parish to attend similar training.

"Over 115 participants, representing 68% of our parishes, participated," Father Bandura said. "These core teams are now working in the parishes to foster vocations to the priesthood, consecrated life, marriage and single life. This is one example of how we are working together to create a 'Culture of Vocations' within our diocese."

He noted that the Feast of the Nativity of Mary is celebrated Sept. 8 and requested prayers for the intercession of Mary for those discerning God's call in their lives.

"I genuinely believe that our prayers to Mary asking for her intercession will assist those struggling to hear God's call," he said. "Mary knows how to listen, and she will help others do the same."





## GCC to mark 60 years with livestreamed Mass

**GREENSBURG** — Greensburg Central Catholic Junior-Senior High School is celebrating its 60th anniversary. The Diocese of Greensburg is marking that special occasion with a livestreamed Mass at **Blessed Sacrament Cathedral** in Greensburg that will premiere Sept. 27 at 9:30 a.m. Father Tyler J. Bandura, school chaplain, will be the celebrant.

GCC has had a Mass for its alumni for the last five years. Typically, it takes place in the spring. This year's Mass was scheduled for May to be held in conjunction with the school's 60th anniversary. A decision was made to postpone due to restrictions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

In an effort to prioritize the health and safety of those who would be celebrating 60 years of Greensburg Central Catholic education, in-person attendance is not possible. However, there still will be a celebration.

The 60th Anniversary Celebration Mass will be streamed live on Greensburg Central Catholic's website at gcchs. org, the GCC Alumni Facebook page, and the school's Facebook Page and YouTube channel.

Greensburg Central Catholic opened its doors Sept. 8, 1959, graduating its first senior class in 1963. Since then, more than 10,000 Centurions have graduated from the region's



premier Catholic high school. "We're looking to celebrate 60 years of Central's history and excellence in education," said Dennis Cremonese, director of institutional advancement.

"The Mass is an opportunity to celebrate 60 years of Greensburg Central Catholic education within a community of faith," added Dr. Greg Bisignani, alumni association president and president of the GCC Advisory Council. "It is a chance to shine a light on a strong foundation of alumni, which are a credit to our school's success."

Throughout its history, the school has stayed true to its founding mission as a college preparatory school that promotes the formation of students within a community of faith.

"We continue to build bridges with our alumni, and our current families realize we're one large Greensburg Central Catholic family that's there for one another," Cremonese said.

"The Golden Wedding Anniversary Mass is special as it honors couples who have lived their vows and have stayed together through sickness and in health, for richer or poorer and in good times and bad," said Father Michael P. Sikon, director of the Office for Worship. "It is a great tribute to those couples who have maintained a long relationship as partners in faith."

"Long relationship" describes Don and Patti Marco of Leechburg, parishioners of Christ the King Parish. They met when they were just 10 years old.

"We had little crushes on each other," Patti recalled. "We went to the junior prom together and started dating when we were 19."

The couple, who have one son, hit the 50-year mark Aug. 1.

Patti's keys to 50 years of marriage: "love and patience."

That is a message shared by most, if not all, of the diocese's couples celebrating 50 years of marriage.

"Through the ups and downs, we stuck with each other," said Kathleen McCombie, who reached the 50-year milestone with her husband, Bill, June 6. "We still love each other. I know we do."

"It's not easy making it 50 years," Linda said. "We just had a lot of trust and faith in one another. We communicated and worked together with our family."

Paul and Bonnie Cassidy of Masontown credit their easygoing nature as a key to five decades as a married couple. "When times get tough, we take them

### ADDRESSING ANXIETIES ABOUT CORONAVIRUS

The past six months has been a time of anxiety for families.

Here is a summary of a presentation I made to help parents guide themselves and their children through the coronavirus crisis. The full presentation is at www.CCharitiesGreensburg. org. Much of the information is from the Centers for Disease Control at www.cdc.gov/ coronavirus/2019-ncov/ daily-life-coping/talking-withchildren.html). How to talk with your children depends on their ages and development and your ability to talk comfortably with them.

The following general guidance from the Centers for Disease Control offers helpful information and support. **Remain calm and** 

**reassuring.** Children will react to both what you say and how you say it. They will pick up cues from the conversations you have with them and with others.

Make yourself available to listen and to talk. Make time to talk. Be sure children know they can come to you when they have questions.

Avoid language that might blame others and lead to stigma. Remember that viruses can make anyone sick, regardless of a person's race or ethnicity. Avoid making assumptions about who might have COVID-19.

Pay attention to what children see or hear on television, radio, or online. Consider reducing the amount of screen time focused on COVID-19. Too much information on one topic can lead to anxiety.

Provide information that is honest and accurate. Give children information that is truthful and appropriate for the age and developmental level of the child. Talk to children about how some stories on COVID-19 on the Internet and social media may be based on rumors and inaccurate information.

Teach children everyday actions to reduce the spread of germs. Remind children to stay away from people who are coughing or sneezing or sick. Remind them to cough or sneeze into a tissue or their elbow, then throw the tissue into the trash. Discuss any new actions that may be taken at school to help protect children and school staff (e.g., increased handwashing, cancellation of events or activities).

**Get children into a handwashing habit.** Teach them to wash their hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after blowing their nose, coughing or sneezing; going to the bathroom; and before eating or preparing food. If soap and water are not available, teach them to use hand sanitizer. Hand sanitizer should contain at least 60% alcohol. Supervise young children when they use hand sanitizer to prevent swallowing alcohol, especially in schools and child care facilities.

If distress impacts activities of your daily life for several days or weeks, talk to a clergy member, counselor, or doctor, or contact the SAMHSA helpline at 800-985-5990.

- Changes in appetite, energy, and activity levels.
- Difficulty concentrating.Difficulty sleeping or

- Physical reactions, such as headaches, body pains, stomach problems and skin rashes.
- Worsening of chronic health problems.
- Anger or short temper.
- Increased use of alcohol, tobacco, or other drugs.

If you experience these or similar feelings or behaviors for several days and are unable to carry out normal family or work responsibilities because of them, please seek professional help. INFORMATION AND REFERRAL CASEWORKER FOR 14 YEARS

### ASSISTANCE PROVIDED TO FAMILIES, INDIVIDUALS

This year has presented new challenges for Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Greensburg as it helps individuals and families especially hard hit by the impact of COVID-19.

The Information and Referral Department received two grants from Catholic Charities USA: \$10,000 to use toward families in need of assistance with bills and or counseling services; and \$1,387 via the Robert Wood Foundation, which was used for counseling services. Those funds are depleted.

Southwestern Pennsylvania United Way provided a \$20,000 grant to assist clients in need with rent and utilities. Those funds are depleted. Msgr. Raymond E. Riffle, managing director, made a request for assistance for families in need before the virtual Divine Mercy Sunday service on April 19. That generated \$22,000 in immediate contributions and eventually resulted in nearly \$67,000 in total donations. Those contributions were used to assist individuals and families affected by the pandemic. Those funds are now depleted.

Because so many families and individuals were adversely impacted by loss of jobs or fewer work hours, greater food expenses because their children were home from school and other factors, Catholic Charities increased the amount of utility assistance provided per family from \$250 to \$700 and increased rental assistance from \$500 to



\$700 per household. Between March 15 and May 31, Catholic Charities distributed 132 food boxes and \$1,430 in Shop 'n Save gift cards for families in need. During the same time frame in 2019, Catholic Charities distributed 37 food boxes and \$350 in Shop 'n Save gift cards.

Families continue to struggle with keeping up with rent and utility bills during this extended pandemic. Catholic Charities will continue to assist as many families as possible during this difficult time.

Restrictions related to the COVID-19 pandemic have resulted in the cancellation of the diocese's three major inperson fundraisers, in an effort to prioritize the health and safety of attendees: the annual Communities of Salt and Light Awards Dinner, which raises nearly \$100,000 each year, the Paul R. Smiy Memorial Golf Outing and the Designer Purse Bash and Crystal Bake Sale.

"As Catholic Charities continues its work to meet the needs of the people in the four counties of the Diocese of Greensburg, your support of our charitable efforts is more important than ever," Managing Director of Catholic Charities Msgr. Raymond E. Riffle said.

The mission of Catholic Charities continues with the first-ever Guardian Angel Appeal, which allows anyone to become a Guardian Angel for those who may be struggling to afford necessities such as food, utilities, water or medical supplies.

Already, an anonymous donor has issued a challenge to match \$25,000 in donations.

Greensburg, and a Grand Knight for Knights of Columbus Council 1480. Firefighters provide an immediate response to all sorts of emergencies and through God's grace are truly life savers. Catholic Charities responds to longer-range realities of disasters such as providing assistance in instances such as tornadoes and floods.

Joe Rice, principal, Aquinas Academy, parishioner of Christ the King Parish, Leechburg. Within days of the Governor's mandatory stay-at-home order, the Catholic Schools of the Diocese of Greensburg were able to move to distance learning. At Catholic Charities, remote connectivity helped thousands of individuals in the Diocese of Greensburg through an information and referral line, as well as a nighttime help line.

Ashley Chappell, Mutual Aid, parishioner of St. Paul Parish, Greensburg. Ashley became a Guardian Angel at a young age, saving her father's life in a swimming pool accident when she was just 7. That continues with her work as an EMT, taking charge recently when a man was hurt playing softball, stopping the bleeding, until he could be taken to a hospital. Like Ashley, Catholic Charities works hard to respond to emergencies like COVID-19. Free webinars were offered to assist parents and children who were struggling with fear and anxiety during the pandemic.

Anne Kovalcik and Debbie Sorce, parishioners of Church of the Good Shepherd Parish, Kent, for Pain into Purpose, a project through the church in which wedding gowns are repurposed for infants who are seriously ill to be baptized at the hospital. For many years, Catholic Charities has assisted organizations in repurposing clothing for infants, children and adults. But it's about more than clothes. It's about providing an uplifting experience and treating every person with dignity.

"Like everyone else, we have been hindered by the restrictions put in place to mitigate the spread of the coronavirus. We have had to cancel three major in-person fundraisers, but we are not letting that stop our work," Riffle said. "I am confident that the people of the diocese will respond to this request for assistance with heartfelt generosity so that, working together, individuals and families who are in need will experience the love of Christ. So even if your personal circumstances prevent you from contributing now, please pray for the success of our work."

### Statement about Father Andrew M. Kawecki

**GREENSBURG** — The Diocese of Greensburg released the following statement following the arrest of Father Andrew M. Kawecki Aug. 26 on charges of sexually assaulting an altar boy in the early 2000s.

The Diocese of Greensburg has and will continue to fully cooperate with authorities regarding the investigation involving Father Kawecki. In May of 2019, the Diocese of Greensburg received its first and only allegation against Father Kawecki when the alleged victim applied to the Survivor's Compensation Fund. After receiving the information on the application, the Diocese notified PA ChildLine and local law enforcement. Father Kawecki was immediately removed from ministry, and his parishioners were notified about the allegation. Father Kawecki denies the allega-

If the allegation is found to be credible and substantiated, his name will be added to the Diocese of Greensburg's List of Clergy with Credible and Substantiated Allegations Against Them. "Credible and substantiated" means that the allegation was proven to be supported by either an admission by the individual to the abuse, a preponderance of the evidence, or through a comprehensive canonical, civil or criminal investigation.

As always, we remind you that if you, or someone you know, has suffered abuse at the hands of anyone related to the Church, please report the abuse to PA ChildLine immediately. The Diocese is here for you to offer support, counseling, spiritual guidance and pastoral care.

## Pope Francis: Put forgiveness and mercy at the heart of your life

**VATICAN CITY (CNA)** — We cannot demand God's forgiveness for ourselves unless we are prepared to forgive our neighbors, Pope Francis said in his Angelus address Sept. 13.

Speaking from a window overlooking St. Peter's Square, the pope said: "If we do not strive to forgive and to love, we will not be forgiven and loved either."

In his address, the pope reflected on the day's Gospel reading (Matthew 18:21-35), in which the apostle Peter asked Jesus how many times he was required to forgive his brother. Jesus replied that it was necessary to forgive "not seven times but seventy-seven times," before telling a story known as the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant.

Pope Francis noted that in the parable the servant owed a vast sum to his master. The master forgave the servant's debt, but the man did not, in turn, forgive the debt of another servant who owed him only a small amount.

"In the parable, we find two different attitudes: that of God — represented by the king — who forgives so



much, because God always

forgives, and that of man. In the divine attitude, justice is pervaded by mercy, whereas the human attitude is limited to justice," he said.

He explained that when Jesus said we must forgive "seventy-seven times" he meant, in biblical language, to forgive always.

"How much suffering, how many lacerations, how many wars could be avoided, if forgiveness and mercy were the style of our life," the pope said.

"It is necessary to apply merciful love to all human relationships: between spouses, between parents and children, within our communities, in the Church, and also in society and politics."

Pope Francis added that he had been struck by a phrase from the day's first reading (Sirach 27:33-28:9), "Remember your last days and set enmity aside."

"Think of the end! Think that you will be in a casket... and will you take the hate there? Think about the end, stop hating! Stop the resentment," he said.

He compared resentment to an annoying fly that keeps buzzing around a person. "To forgive is not only a momentary thing, it is a continuous thing against this resentment, this hatred that returns. Let's think about the end, let's stop hating," the pope said.

He suggested that the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant could shed light on the phrase in the Lord's Prayer, "And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors."

"These words contain a decisive truth. We cannot demand God's forgiveness for ourselves if we in turn do not grant forgiveness to our neighbor," he said.

After reciting the Angelus, the pope expressed his sorrow at a fire that broke out Sept. 8 at Europe's largest refugee camp, leaving 13,000 people without shelter.

He recalled a visit that he made to the camp on the Greek island of Lesbos in 2016, with Bartholomew I, the Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople, and Ieronymos II, Archbishop of Athens and all Greece. In a joint declaration, they had committed themselves to ensuring that migrants, refugees and asylum-seekers receive "a humane reception in Europe." "I express solidarity and closeness to all the victims of these dramatic events," he said.

The pope noted that protests had broken out in various countries in recent months amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

Without mentioning any nations by name, he said: "While I urge the demonstrators to present their demands peacefully, without giving in to the temptation of aggression and violence, I appeal to all those who have public and governmental responsibilities to listen to the voice of their fellow citizens and to meet their just aspirations, ensuring full respect for human rights and civil liberties."

"Finally, I invite the ecclesial communities living in such contexts, under the guidance of their pastors, to work in favor of dialogue, always in favor of dialogue, and in favor of reconciliation."

He said: "In the current context, this collection is even more a sign of hope and solidarity with the Christians living in the land where God became flesh and died and rose again for us."



# Respect Life Month focuses on 25th anniversary of 'Gospel of Life'

EDITOR'S NOTE: The prophetic papal encyclical Evangelium vitae (The Gospel of Life) was written by Saint Pope St. John Paul II in 1995 to reaffirm the value and inviolability of every human life and to appeal to all people to respect, protect, love, and serve every human life. The following is a brief overview of this important document from the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. On the 25th anniversary of the release of the encyclical, it is the theme of this year's Respect Life Month.

The Gospel of Life is at the heart of Jesus' saving message to the world. Through the Incarnation and birth of Christ, God reveals to us the dignity of all human life. Human life, as a gift of God, is sacred and inviolable. The Son of God has united himself with every human being and desires for us to share eternal life with him. For this reason, direct attacks on human life, such as abortion and euthanasia, are always unacceptable. Yet, sadly we see new and expanding threats to human life emerging on an alarming scale. These new threats to life are often justified, protected, and even promoted by our laws and culture.

Not only must human life not be taken, but it must be protected with loving concern. Each of us is made in the image and likeness of God, and we reflect his glory in the world. God made the human person with the capacity to love and reason and share in a relationship with the Creator. The human person bears an indelible imprint of God and is the pinnacle of all creation. The source of our dignity is not only linked to our creation by God, but to our final end and destiny to spend eternity with the Father. By

accepting Christ as our Savior, despite our sinfulness, we can begin to share in eternal life even now.

Despite the grave threats to human life in the modern world, we, as the People of God, are called to place our faith in Jesus, the "Word of life" (1 Jn 1:1). As Christians, we have received the full truth about human life as proclaimed by the very person of Jesus. In sharing in the lowliest and most vulnerable conditions of human life — even death on a cross — Jesus shows us that life is *always good*. The true meaning of our lives is found in giving and receiving love. It is only through this understanding of a sincere gift of self that human sexuality and procreation reach their true and full significance.

God holds the lives of all people in his gentle and loving care, giving meaning and value to any sufferings that we may bear. Despite the mystery which surrounds suffering and death, they can become saving events as we unite them with Christ's sacrifice. Truly great must be the value of human life if the Son of God has made it the instrument of our salvation.

While the roots of violence against life go all the way back to Genesis, when Cain took the life of his brother Abel, our modern world is suffering under a culture of death. Scientific and technological advances and an increasingly secularized world have led to an eclipse of the value of human life. However, respect for life requires that science and technology should always be at the service of the human person and his integral development. We must reject systems of structuralized sin which value efficiency and productivity over human persons.

Governments and international institutions promote abortion and euthanasia as marks of progress and freedom. But this is a false and perverse understanding in which freedom is equated with absolute individualism. True freedom is inherently relational, recognizing that God has entrusted us to one another. As cultures and societies fail to recognize these objective truths, everything becomes relative and all principles are called into question—even the fundamental right to life. However, the blood of Christ's sacrifice remains our constant hope. Christ's gift of himself on the cross reveals how precious life truly is and gives us the strength to commit ourselves to building a *culture of life*. Christ's blood, shed for us, promises that in God's plan death will be no more, and life will be victorious.

Society as a whole must respect, defend and promote the dignity of every human person, at every moment and in every condition of that person's life. Our lives are a gift from God and ultimately belong to him. He has sole authority over life and death. We are therefore called to reverence and love every human person, loving our neighbors as ourselves. It is our responsibility to care for and protect human life, especially the lives of the most vulnerable among us.

Having received the gift of the Gospel of Life, we are the people of life and a people for life. It is our duty to proclaim the Gospel of Life to the world. To proclaim Jesus is to proclaim *life itself.* Gratitude and joy at the incomparable dignity of the human person impel us to bring the Gospel of life to the hearts of all people and make it penetrate every part of society. In every child which is born and in every person who lives or dies we see the image of God's glory. We celebrate this glory in every human being, a sign of the living God, an icon of Jesus Christ.
