## Diocese plans in-person, streaming and televised Christmas Masses

**GREENSBURG** — With concerns over a resurgence in coronavirus cases, particularly in the four counties of the Diocese of Greensburg, diocesan leaders are making efforts to stay connected to parishioners during Advent and Christmas.

A virtual Advent calendar and related content are live on the Diocese of Greensburg Facebook page. A list of in-person and streaming Christmas Vigil and Christmas Day Masses for

parishes is on page 4. Be sure to confirm Mass times by visiting parish websites or social media, as changes may occur due to the pandemic.

Additionally, the Diocese has decided to televise Christmas Masses to engage the faithful who may not have internet access or cannot attend in-person due to health-related concerns.

This is the first time the diocese will televise Christmas Masses, even though in-person Masses are still scheduled in all parish communities in Armstrong, Fayette, Indiana and Westmoreland counties.

Larry J. Kulick, will celebrate a Mass from Blessed Sacrament Cathedral, which will be broadcast at 10 a.m. on Christmas Day. Both Masses will air on PCNC, the Pittsburgh Cable News Channel. Christmas Day Mass also will air at noon on WPXI Channel 11. For nearly nine months, the

## Father Bede Joseph Hasso, OSB

**LATROBE** — Benedictine Father Bede Joseph Hasso, 91, a monk of Saint Vincent Archabbey, died Nov. 2, 2020. Born March 26, 1929, in Port Vue, he earned a bachelor of arts degree in philosophy from Saint Vincent College in 1953. He attended Saint Vincent Seminary and also

studied at Columbia Technical College, Columbus, Ga., Pratt University, Brooklyn, N.Y., and the former Beaver College, Glenside, Pa.

He was ordained a priest in Saint Vincent Archabbey Basilica by Greensburg Bishop Hugh Lamb May 26, 1957.

Father Bede served as assistant pastor of St. Vincent Basilica Parish, Latrobe (1957-62) and Sacred Heart Parish, Jeannette (1962-64), and pastor of St. Martin Parish, New Derry (1984-96). He also served in parishes in



Pittsburgh, Waynesburg, Ohio, Virginia Beach, Va., and Covington, Ky. From 1997-2009 he assisted on weekends at parishes in the Diocese of Greensburg, including Holy Family and St. John the Evangelist parishes, Latrobe; St. Bruno Parish, South Greensburg; St. Benedict Parish, Marguerite;

and St. Bede Parish, Bovard.

Father Bede taught at James Barry-Robinson School, Virginia Beach (1966-67) and Benedictine Military High School, Savannah, Ga. (1967-75). He was a prefect in the former Saint Vincent Preparatory School (1953-54) and registrar at Saint Vincent College (1964-66).

A funeral Mass was held Nov. 6 in the Archabbey Basilica, with interment in the Mary, Mother of Mercy Mausoleum Chapel at Saint Vincent Cemetery.

## Father Jonathan J. Murrman, OSB

**LATROBE** — Benedictine Father Jonathan J. Murrman, 94, a monk of Saint Vincent Archabbey, died Nov. 2,

Born in Jeannette May 12, 1926, Father Jonathan received a bachelor of arts degree from Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, and his

theological training at Saint Vincent Seminary. He entered Saint Vincent Archabbey in 1958 and was ordained a priest in Saint Vincent Archabbey Basilica by Greensburg Bishop William G. Connare May 22, 1965.

Father Jonathan served as assistant pastor at parishes in Patton and St.



Marys, Pa., from 1965–1977. He provided pastoral assistance on weekends at parishes in the Greensburg and Pittsburgh dioceses. He was a coordinator and carpenter in the Maintenance Department at Saint Vincent Archabbey, College, and Seminary since

Before entering the monastic community, Father Jonathan served in the U.S. Army in Germany.

A funeral Mass was held Nov. 7 in the Archabbey Basilica, with interment in the Mary, Mother of Mercy Mausoleum Chapel at Saint Vincent Cemetery.

## Sister Marlene Mondalek, SC

**GREENSBURG** — Sister of Charity Marlene Mondalek (formerly Sister Marie Maron), 79, died at Mother Seton House, a community residence in Seoul, South Korea, Nov. 16, 2020. Born in Pittsburgh, she was in her 61st year of religious life.

Sister Marlene taught in schools of the Greensburg and Pittsburgh dioceses. She taught at the Sisters of Charity of Seton Hill's Saint Joseph Girls' High School in Gangjin, South Korea, from 1967-78.



She served as regional superior for the Sisters of Charity in Korea from 1984-93, when she was elected provincial superior. In 1997, she was elected vice president of the Sisters of Charity. In 2002, when the U.S. Province of the Sisters of Charity was formed, Sister Marlene was elected general superior

of the two provinces, United States and Korea, and re-elected in 2008.

A funeral liturgy was held in Korea Nov. 21, followed by burial in the Damyang Catholic Cemetery there.

GREENSBURG — The Diocese of Greensburg has announced "The Week of Grace" with extended penance opportunities during the Advent season. During The Week of Grace, prepare your heart to receive the Lord at Christmas.

The Week of Grace is scheduled for Dec. 14-18 and provides extended opportunities for the sacrament of penance at every parish community throughout the Diocese of Greensburg. Times are listed by county at dioceseofgreensburg.org/weekof grace, providing the opportunity to find a location that works best for

you to receive the sacrament.

The sacrament of penance is God's gift to us so that any sin committed after baptism can be forgiven. Confession involves the private confessing of sins to a priest and receiving absolution for those sins.

Advent is traditionally a time when Catholics choose to receive the sacrament of penance as they ask for healing and forgiveness time in preparation for Christmas and celebrating the birth of Christ.

"Every effort is being made to keep penitents safe during The Week of Grace. Every parish has submitted a safety plan in compliance with COVID-19 protocols for confession," said Msgr. Larry J. Kulick, diocesan administrator. "We are observing social distancing, adhering to cleaning and sanitization protocols, and using face coverings.

"We realize that many still will not feel comfortable gathering at their parish. But extending the opportunity for individuals to receive the sacrament of penance should help our parishes avoid long lines and large gatherings."

## Indiana parish adapts faith formation for children during pandemic

**INDIANA** — Children continue to develop their spiritual connection to God using the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd approach at St. Thomas More University Parish.

This model of faith formation offers children a hands-on opportunity to explore the words of Jesus and the liturgy of the Church in a specially prepared room called an atrium.

"It's very much relational with the inner teachings of the Holy Spirit, working with the children together as families and together with each other," explained Mary Beth Palko, director of Catechesis of the Good Shepherd and youth ministry at the

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd began in 2006 at St. Thomas More University Parish for children ages 3-6. Over the years it has grown to include children through age 12.

Palko said in most years, more than 80 children participate in the atrium. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, 44 children are taking part.

The pandemic caused a shift in the process, and materials were sent to families so they can participate.

"When we went into COVID, it was a difficult time for everyone, so, with the national organization, Catechesis of the Good Shepherd USA, we began to look at how we can bring parts of this work into the home for the families," Palko said.

For the Advent season, this includes maps of Israel in the time of Jesus; scrolls containing prophecies from Isaiah, Numbers and Micah; handwritten Scripture chart scrolls of the infancy narratives found in the Gospels; handwritten Scripture chart scroll of the regions, waterways and cities of Israel in the time of Jesus; an Advent wreath blessing; an Advent song to sing with the name for each candle — peace, hope, joy and love; Advent candles; and tabs to place in

"They have all of those possibilities to begin to explore more fully the Bible and the Scripture pages referenced in them," Palko said. "They also have the Bible tabs so that they will be able to feel much more at home in looking through them and being able to relate to the Bible itself, and looking for the particular Scriptures. It's much more hands-on for the families, and they feel more comfortable with the Scripture."

In the beginning of the catechetical year, the parish provided each family with a Bible, four liturgical prayer cloths in white, purple, green and red, an image of the Good Shepherd, and a prayer candle.

"Since October, they have had the opportunity to gather as a family or as individuals to be able to take that time by themselves or with their families working on their materials," Palko

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is based in Scripture and liturgy and uses the teaching method of



renowned Italian educator Maria Montessori, which views children as naturally eager for knowledge and capable of initiating learning in a supportive and well-prepared learning environment.

At St. Thomas More University Parish, virtual encounters take place twice monthly and last about 20-30

minutes. During this time, the catechist and children reflect on a particular Scripture or material related to the liturgical year.

"The time between our gatherings allows for the families to continue the work and prayer in their own time to nurture the life in the domestic church," Palko said.

## Faith formation, youth ministry overcome COVID-19 challenges

**GREENSBURG** — When it first became prevalent in March, the COVID-19 pandemic brought challenges to all aspects of life.

Parish leaders in faith formation and youth ministry were not immune to these challenges. As schools and churches closed, the way that parishes provided faith formation to young people was required to change significantly.

No longer could parishes gather students for faith formation in classrooms and atriums, or for intergenerational meals and lessons. It quickly became apparent to parish leaders that they, too, would need to pivot to make sure that the faith was still being shared with the parish children and youth.

"It was like a disaster recalled Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus Sister Jeanne Marie Vonder Haar, director of faith formation of Blessed Sacrament Cathedral in Greensburg. "I had no clue what I should be doing. The parents were so overwhelmed. We didn't start with kids until the fall."

Sister Jeanne Marie said

video clips of the readings of the upcoming Sunday are sent to children each week, as well as different activities in which they can become

"It allows me to stay connected with the kids," she said. "At least they know that they're connected to the parish in some way."

That has been the hardest part for Sister Jeanne Marie throughout the virtual faith formation — not having the interaction with the students.

But she said it has gone "pretty well."

As the school year ended and summer progressed, it became apparent that more than likely parishes would not be returning to the traditional models of faith formation in the fall.

Throughout the summer, leaders continued to develop plans for how they would share and teach the faith in the fall as children and teens prepared for a new school and formation year. Leaders familiarized themselves with online classroom management tools and virtual presentation platforms.

The new faith formation vear began this fall with more than 50% of diocesan parishes doing some form of virtual learning. Other parishes shared resources with

parents so that as the primary catechists of their children, they were able to continue with formation at home.

While the world has looked less than ordinary, parish communities have strived to continue bringing formation to young people.

"The attendance has been pretty good with the kids," Sister Jeanne Marie said. "Recently we had a reconciliation retreat for the second-graders. I scanned every activity that we were going to be doing and sent it to their homes. It was just amazing to see their participation. I was excited about that, and I think the kids were, too."

## First Guardian Angel Appeal exceeds goals, raises \$233,950

**GREENSBURG** — Msgr. Raymond E. Riffle was absolutely delighted with the results of the inaugural Guardian Angel Appeal, Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Greensburg's six-week virtual fundraising campaign.

It's understandable for the managing director of Catholic Charities to feel that way. The campaign eclipsed every goal set by raising \$233,950 to honor Heroes of Hope — those who continued contributing to the community amid the COVID-19 crisis.

"There's no way I could express how amazed I am at the success of the campaign, not because of any doubts about the generosity of the people of the diocese, but about the reality of the situation, that we went out to ask for support in the middle of a pandemic," Msgr. Riffle said. "I think it literally says (Diocese of Greensburg parishioners) are always mindful of their responsibility as followers of Jesus Christ to care for the people God has placed in our lives."

Heather Rady, director of community relations and special events for Catholic Charities, also was pleased.

"This is just phenomenal, truly," she said. "I am over the moon. Overall, this was just far more wonderful than we even expected."

Initially, modest goals were set as the campaign kicked off Oct. 2, such as \$25,000, then \$100,000. An anonymous donor offered to match \$25,000 in donations. Then the campaign received an anonymous donation of \$100,000, and a goal to raise \$200,000 was set.

Msgr. Riffle admitted that the \$100,000 donation was a boost to the campaign, but he was impressed with all the donations that were received.

"Obviously, it was a game-changer, but it shows us the depth of an individual's commitment to the work that Jesus has entrusted to us for the poor," he said. "I would like to believe each and every person, regardless of what they gave, has the same motivation and dedication."

Funds raised will help to continue the charitable works of Catholic Char-

ities for people in Armstrong, Fayette, Indiana and Westmoreland counties, regardless of their faith, who may be struggling to afford necessities such as food, utilities, fuel and baby items.

"Every year, we use all of the money that comes in, so it's not like we're storing up money from past years," Msgr. Riffle said. "We've used it all as it has come in, so this year is no different; and I expect, given the climate going forward, that that will also be the case this year — that we'll be able to use it and put it where it's most needed."

The Guardian Angel Appeal was launched as part of the Diocese of Greensburg's ongoing response to COVID-19. ## Ford City churches donate funds to appeal

**FORD CITY** — In recent years, Ford City area churches have raised money for disaster relief with their annual Oktoberfest fundraiser. This year, the funds are staying local.

Oktoberfest brought in \$3,050, which was donated to Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Greensburg, as part of its Guardian Angel Appeal virtual fundraising campaign.

Catholic Charities is the primary social service agency of the diocese.

This year's Oktoberfest, which took place at First Baptist Church of Ford City, had to be a takeout event, as the churches adhered to protocols necessitated by the pandemic.

Other participating churches were First Baptist Church, Second Baptist Church, Appleby Manor Church, Emanuel Heilman Lutheran Church, First Church of Ford City, Ford Memorial United Methodist Church and Grace Lutheran Church of Manorville.

"No matter what faith we are, this shows that we can come together for the common purpose of sharing God's love with people," Moore said, getting emotional when talking about the fundraiser. "With God, everything is possible."

In 2019, Oktoberfest raised about \$2,300 and included raffles. Since this year was so successful, Moore said it could stay a takeout event in the future.

"If we're making (more) money and you don't have to cover the tables and do the dishes and throw the garbage away and you can have more people, we just thought it worked out well," Moore said. "Churches are doing a lot of takeouts and it's really working."

Rady was impressed with the joint effort of churches of various denominations.

"These are all churches that have to respond to the needs of their parishioners," she said. "I thought it was really admirable and selfless that they made the donation to us when they could use the money themselves."





## Filipino priests seek help for typhoon devastation in homeland

GREENSBURG — When Typhoon Goni, known in the Philippines as Super Typhoon Rolly, tore through his homeland last month, Father Ronald L. Maquiñana wanted to help those dealing with its aftermath.

The pastor of St. Mary, Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish in Kittanning and St. Mary, Mother of God Parish in Yatesboro contacted Msgr. Larry J. Kulick, diocesan administrator, asking that his parish and others be allowed to help.

Msgr. Kulick wanted to help, especially since one-quarter of the Diocese of Greensburg's priests are international.

When disasters occur in their home countries, he said, "We try to respond as we can."

#### Helping their homeland

Father Maquiñana is a native of Daraga in the province of Albay, Bicol Region of Philippines, one of the areas hardest hit when Typhoon Goni (Rolly) made landfall Nov. 1.

In his appeal, Father Maquiñana wrote of his concern and that of his fellow Filipino priests in the diocese for their "Filipino brothers and sisters" who were devastated by the typhoon.

Many families lost loved ones, their homes and their livelihoods, prompting the Filipino priests to find ways to provide assistance.

"My region was badly affected. All of my siblings were affected," Father Maquiñana said. "They are struggling right now because their houses were damaged."

Shelters are full, and worries about the spread of COVID-19 make the possibility of relocating, even temporarily, difficult.

"It's really heartbreaking," Father Maquiñana said. "It was scary. They told me the typhoon started in the morning and lasted until evening,"

#### Homes, worship sites hard hit

The typhoon brought wind gusts reaching 164 mph and was reported as one of the strongest typhoons to hit the Philippines in seven years. More than a dozen people were reported to have been killed, while tens of thousands were left homeless. Churches, some historical, also were damaged, Father Maquiñana added.

Residents are in need of basic necessities, such as clothing, food and water.



"It will take a lot of time to rebuild their homes," he said.

#### Faraway plea

Msgr. Kulick also was petitioned directly by Archbishop Rolando J. Tria Tirona of Caceres, Philippines.

In his Nov. 10 letter, Archbishop Tirona noted Rolly's resulting "terrible destruction to properties, vegetations and displacement of many poor families."

Many parish churches served as evacuation sites, he added.

"Reports from our Social Action
Center state that many families affected by the super typhoon are farmers and fishermen. Many of the parish churches in the Archdiocese of Caceres were not spared by the whipping strong winds, with churches' roofs and even heavy doors blown away, and in some instances there was flooding (to) the interior of the church," Tirona wrote.

Funds raised will assist with "present dire needs and help rebuild their livelihood," he said.

A collection designated for the typhoon relief efforts will be taken at certain diocesan parishes. Donations also may be sent to the Diocese of Greensburg, 723 E. Pittsburgh St., Greensburg, PA 15601, with the notation "For Philippine Typhoon Relief Effort."



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## Family relies on faith, community during daughter's cancer battle

**HILLER** — For the Sealy family, COVID-19 has become a secondary challenge during this year that is testing their faith.

Last spring, shortly after the statewide shutdown to help stop the spread of the coronavirus, Shannon Sealy and her husband, Ron, noticed that their usually active 10-year-old daughter, Olivia ("Livi") was dragging her left foot and not using her left arm normally.

After a series of doctor appointments and tests, Livi and her mother were at UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh where a May 22 MRI confirmed a diagnosis no parent ever wants to hear.

Their daughter has a pilocytic astrocytoma, a mass on the right side of the thalamus, which was causing the problems on the left side of her body.

"I got physically sick and remember screaming," Shannon said.

After two biopsies, it was determined the tumor is benign. But surgery is not a treatment option because of the tumor's location. Livi is going through a grueling 18-month routine of twice-monthly chemotherapy treatments at Children's Hospital, where she also undergoes physical and occupational therapy.

"While the prognosis is good, getting there is a marathon," Shannon said.

Shannon is the business manager and secretary at the partner parishes of St. Peter Parish, Brownsville, and St. Cecilia Parish, Grindstone. Ron works at California University of Pennsylvania. The couple also has a 3-year-old son, Colin.

Shannon said the first chemo treatment of the month is "horrific," leaving Livi sick from Friday to the following Wednesday or Thursday, but the second treatment is not as harsh.

She admits to occasional moments of anger about the situation, but also says that she and Ron, who recently had successful surgery to clean a carotid artery, are blessed.

"We are very blessed, and we know that," she said. "We could be dealing with a totally different diagnosis."

The tumor has not affected Livi's cognitive abilities and schoolwork, as she has maintained an A average at Brownsville Area Elementary School, according to Shannon.

Shannon said she believes God is helping her through the frenetic schedule.

"I don't know how I get up every morning, how I put one foot in front of another," she said. "You do what you have to do for your child."

Livi said she was "scared, confused and nervous" when she learned about her condition, but she talks with God about it. She is thankful for all the help her family has received.

Her maternal grandparents make frequent trips from the Philadelphia area to help take care of Livi and Colin, and members of Ron's family, who live in the Brownsville area, also help.

Their presence "makes me feel better because I love them," Livi said.

Father Timothy J. Kruthaupt, pastor of the partner parishes, said parishioners are going out of their way to help the family.

"That is beautiful to see," he said. Parishioners and friends from throughout the Brownsville community formed Team Livi this summer to provide emotional and financial support. More than 1,200 tickets were sold for a spaghetti dinner fundraiser in September.

Livi was not able to attend because her immune system is weakened by the chemotherapy. But she was able to watch a livestream of the event, which was held at the Brownsville Sons and Daughters of Italy, from the new parish center. Friends from DeeDee's Studio of Dance, Brownsville, where Livi danced when she was healthy, performed some of her favorites.

A family friend, Davis Slagle, established an online store through his company, Bee Graphix, to help offset the family's medical expenses. The site's items include T-shirts and protective face masks with a Team Livi graphic.

He also helped establish a GoFund-Me page: www.gofundme.com/f/help-livi-beat-brain-cancer.

Shannon repeated the Thanksgiving message the family posted on the page: "We can't begin to thank each and every one of you for your love, support, prayers, gifts and attending fundraisers during the hardest times of our lives. 2020 has made us put into perspective what love means. You all have shown us love."






