Bishop installs new pastors around Diocese

GREENSBURG — Bishop Larry J. Kulick is celebrating Masses at many Diocesan parishes this summer to install new pastors.

There are 13 installation Masses scheduled through Aug. 31.

"I wanted to install each of the pastors to show my gratitude for their generous service and their willingness to take on this responsibility," Bishop Kulick said. "I also wanted to take an opportunity to thank the parish communities for receiving their new pastors, assuring them of my support and the support of the Diocese. This is a really concrete way to show that, because the Bishop sends a pastor to lead the local community, the pastor is his

personal representative in the parish."

Bishop Kulick presented Father Onoko with a statue of Christ the Good Shepherd, which he plans to present to all of the new pastors.

"Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, talks a lot about the pastoral role of the priest and is always reminding the priests that they are to imitate Christ the Good Shepherd," he said. "I hope this small token will remind you every day to imitate Christ the Good Shepherd as the shepherd of this parish."

The first of this year's installation Masses took place July 1 as Father Anthony A. Onoko was installed as the new Pastor of St. Raymond of the Mountains Parish in Donegal.

Father Onoko had been Parochial Vicar at the parish, as well as St. Pius X and Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary parishes in Mount Pleasant, since March 16, 2020. He also will serve as Chaplain at Greensburg Central Catholic Junior-Senior High School, while remaining Chaplain at Excela Health Frick Hospital and Harmon House in Mount Pleasant.

There was a capacity crowd on hand for the Mass at St. Raymond of the Mountains Parish, which delighted Father Onoko.

"You can be anywhere you want, and you chose to be here to celebrate with us, and I appreciate that greatly," he said. "May the seeds being sown this day grow, flourish and sprout to the glory of God and the joy of His holy people."

During his homily, he told parishioners to have faith for whatever it is that they need, for God will provide for them.

Mass obligation returning Aug. 15

The following statement was issued in unison with Bishops across the Pennsylvania province:

We have all known and felt the impact of COVID-19 in so many ways as individuals and families, among friends and at work. It has been a time of hardship and struggle, of separation and isolation. It has also had an impact on our lives of faith. Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, has been with us throughout this very difficult period and is most especially near to us when we encounter him in the Eucharist. The Eucharist offers us his healing and peace, his mercy and reconciliation. It is time for everyone to return to the Eucharist with renewed faith and joy.

As life returns to normalcy in so many ways, each Catholic Bishop in Pennsylvania will reinstate the obligation to attend Mass in person on Sundays and Holy Days beginning on Sunday, Aug. 15, 2021, the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Bishops had dispensed you from this obligation in March of 2020 as the developing coronavirus pandemic required people not to assemble in

group settings. Now, with the impact of the pandemic considerably reduced, it is again possible for the faithful to assemble for the Eucharist and the time for us to lift the dispensation from the obligation.

The obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days comes from our Baptism as Christians. Baptism compels Christians to unite themselves with Christ at the altar in his saving Sacrifice of the Cross. "Participation in the communal celebration of the Sunday Eucharist is a testimony of belonging and of being faithful to Christ and to his Church (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2182). This is the foundation for the law of the Church that binds Catholics to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days (Code of Canon Law, canon 1247) and the Christian way fully to observe the Third Commandment, to keep holy the Lord's Day (Deuteronomy 5:12; Exodus 31:15; Catechism of the Catholic Church, nos. 2180-2181).

This obligation, as is always the case, does not apply to those who are seriously ill, have a serious health risk, as well as those who have serious anxiety of being a part of large groups at this time. Likewise, the obligation does not apply to those who care for those who cannot attend Mass in person (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2181). Those who are legitimately excused from Mass on Sundays and Holy Days are encouraged to spend time in prayer, meditating on the Death and Resurrection of the Lord, reading the Sacred Scriptures, and uniting themselves to Christ in his worship of the Father of us all. Those who are legitimately excused are also encouraged to view a broadcast of the Mass which is intended for those who cannot participate in person.

As your Bishops, we welcome this moment of the reinstatement of the obligation for all Catholics in Pennsylvania. This is a moment to thank God anew for the great gift of the Mass and the Real Presence of Jesus to us in his Holy Body and Blood as well as the joy of gathering together as people of faith.

'Christ Is the Truth,' new approach to spiritual formation

GREENSBURG — In an effort to combat the multi-generational drift away from knowing, living and proclaiming the faith, Bishop Larry J. Kulick has announced a strategic initiative called "Christ Is the Truth."

This plan will develop enhanced holistic formation programs in Armstrong, Fayette, Indiana and Westmoreland counties for every child and every adult who wants to learn and live the Catholic faith.

To begin this endeavor, he appointed Dr. Maureen Marsteller as Managing Director of the Office of Faith, Family and Discipleship, in addition to her current role as Superintendent of Catholic Schools. Marsteller is tasked with undertaking a year of study and

consultation, after which she will work alongside the Bishop and all stakeholders to transform religious education and spiritual formation programs in our schools, parishes and other Diocesan ministries.

"I am proud of the great work our Catholic schools accomplish in the name of evangelization and formation. But they serve a limited number of Catholic youth in our Diocese," Bishop Kulick said. "I envision greater collaboration, as well as integration, between our schools and our parishes with regard to religious formation, sacramental preparation and ongoing adult education."

"During our year of study, we will determine what that collaboration and integration will look like and how it will be implemented," Marsteller said. "We hope to develop a system of Catholic

faith formation that is woven into the fabric of parish life so that Catholics are supported in their life journey from baptism throughout adulthood. They will be knowledgeable in the faith and will be able to share their joy and discovery of the truths of the Catholic faith with others."

The "Christ Is the Truth" initiative stems from Bishop Kulick's own motto, which implies that to know the truth, we need to know Christ. Christus Est Veritas, the Latin translation of Christ Is the Truth, appears on the Bishop's

"In a world sometimes lost in confusion, people are searching for the truth," he said. "As people of faith, we believe Christ came to reveal, teach and live the truth. As disciples of Christ, we are called to embrace this reality."

Traveling Vatican exhibit shines light on eucharistic miracles

UNIONTOWN — Jesus' real presence — body, blood, soul and divinity — in the sacrament of the Eucharist is a core belief of the Catholic faith.

The real presence and the many miracles associated with it are at the heart of the "Vatican International Exhibition — Eucharistic Miracles of the World," which was held in June at St. Joseph Parish Hall, Uniontown, and will be held at St. John Baptist de La Salle Parish, Delmont, in early August.

The exhibition features information about the 153 Vatican-approved eucharistic miracles throughout the world. The full-color panels include photographs, art and descriptions of the different miracles, which date back to the third century in Egypt. The most recent eucharistic miracle occurred in Tixtla, Mexico, in 2006.

The exhibit is a chance for parishioners to see what Catholics believe, said Father Anthony J. Klimko, Pastor of the four parishes in Uniontown: St. Joseph, St. John the Evangelist, St. Mary (Nativity) and St. Therese, Little Flower of Jesus.

"I want people to really know what's happening (at the prayer of consecration). That prayer is not just words," he said, explaining why he had the exhibit brought to Uniontown.

Catholics' belief that Jesus' body and blood is present in the Eucharist has been declining for many years.

A Pew Research Center survey of Catholics and the real presence released in August 2019 showed that 69% of all self-described Catholics (a group that includes those who do not attend Mass regularly) believe that the bread and wine are just symbols of Christ's presence.

The number of people who believe in the real presence rises dramatically among Catholics who attend Mass at least once a week: According to the Pew study, 63% of the most observant Catholics believe in transubstantiation — that the bread and wine become the real body and blood of Christ during the Mass.

Even that leaves more than one-third of observant Catholics (37%) who believe that the Communion bread and wine are just symbols of Christ's presence, not his body and blood.

Theresa Mazur, director of faith formation at the Uniontown parishes, said she hopes the exhibit, which was held at St. Joseph Parish June 9-20, helped put "a fire in the hearts" of parishioners and helps motivate them to return to Mass and the reception of

the sacrament of the Eucharist after the long absence during the COVID pandemic.

The exhibition is the result of the deep faith and reverence of the Eucharist by Blessed Carlo Acutis, who died of leukemia at the age of 15 in 2006 in Milan, Italy. In 2002, he decided to use his computer skills to prepare an exhibit about miracles related to the Eucharist. The exhibit, which took 2½ years to prepare, has been seen on five continents. In the United States alone, it has been hosted by thousands of parishes and more than 100

universities, according to the exhibition's website.

Acutis was beatified Oct. 10, 2020.

The Mazur family — Matthew (Theresa's brother), Heather and their 10-year-old daughter, Addison — attended the exhibition after Mass June 20.

"Jesus is reaching out to people through the Eucharist," Matthew said, but feels that something is missing in reverence for the Eucharist.

Heather, who is Presbyterian, was particularly interested in Acutis' story. "I was impressed by his youth and interested in his faith and how he wanted to share it," said Heather.

Addison was also impressed by Acutis and what someone of his age could accomplish.

"He was pretty amazing," she said.

The exhibition will be held at St. John Baptist de La Salle Parish, Delmont, July 31-Aug. 8. Times and other information will be announced later.

St. Sylvester Parish marks 100 years of faith in Slickville

SLICKVILLE — Thanks to the faith, prayers and perseverance of parishioners and pastors, St. Sylvester Parish celebrated its 100th anniversary June 20.

'They found peace. They found safety. They found security, because their faith was strong and their belief was resilient," said Bishop Larry J. Kulick, who celebrated the anniversary Mass. "They persevered through their journey because their faith was

Current Pastor Father John J. Harrold set the stage for the parish's next 100 years.

"We will continue to live the faith in Slickville as we start into the second century," Father Harrold said.

Former pastors Father Richard J. Kosisko, Msgr. Raymond E. Riffle, Father Anthony J. Carbone, Father James M. Goldberg and Father Salvatore R. Lamendola attended the Mass.

The day's Gospel (Mk 4:35-41) described a storm in the Sea of Galilee and the chaos that faced Jesus and his disciples. Jesus calmed the storm, asking his disciples to have faith and not be afraid.

During his homily, Bishop Kulick said those involved in the development of St. Sylvester parish 100 years ago faced different types of storms, such as the challenges for immigrants establishing new lives in a foreign land.

"They navigated through these difficult waters with responsibilities that we could hardly imagine," he said. "What allowed them to cross over the sea of chaos in their life and face one challenge after another — their faith."

The original church was dedicated June 21, 1921. An addition was built in 1932. The groundbreaking for the "new" church was Dec. 31, 1961; it was dedicated Aug. 11, 1963.

Benedictines served the parish from 1920-61. Father Edwin H. Hirt was the first resident pastor from 1961-67. He was succeeded by 14 pastors and two deacons.

Bishop Kulick expressed gratitude to every member of the St. Sylvester Parish family, past and present.

"Thank you and all of those who have gone before you for the wonderful work you have done over this last century in not only proclaiming the Gospel message, but indeed being a viable and living witness to Christ and to the message of his church in this community and beyond," he said. "Not only your own personal fidelity, but your charity, your community outreach and the wonderful example you have given with your daily lives have been a tremendous sign of the Kingdom of God."

Sacred Heart Parish reopens for worship after nearly year's closure

JEANNETTE — Deacon William M. Newhouse told parishioners at Sacred Heart Parish during Mass June 27 that a goal he had set for that day had been reached: getting the church ready for its first Mass since August 2020.

Having the Mass celebrated before a large crowd made the morning even more special.

"I was very pleased," said Deacon Newhouse, Administrator. "It wasn't easy. It was a lot of work. I was crossing my fingers and praying and hoping everything would turn out fine. Things came together. The parishioners stepped forward last week, and (Saturday) we took care of the finishing

On June 19, volunteers helped with the interior cleanup of the church, an important step in having the building ready for its first Mass.

Water damage has plagued the church since 2012. Attempts have been made over the last eight years to repair interior, exterior and underground drains. As more damage was

close the church in August 2020. In May, the church was deemed safe to reopen for worship.

"Their vision made this day possible," he said.

Native son returns home to lead flock in Ford City

FORD CITY — The influence of his hometown of Leechburg prompted Bishop Larry J. Kulick to assign another young priest to a parish in his own hometown.

Father Eric J. Dinga became Pastor of his home parish, Christ, Prince of Peace Parish in his native Ford City, and of St. Lawrence Parish in Cadogan, June 24.

A 2007 graduate of the former Ford City High School, Father Dinga, 32, celebrated his first Mass as a priest in 2015 at Christ, Prince of Peace Parish. His family still lives in the area, and his father is principal of The Divine Redeemer School, which is next to the church.

Bishop Kulick saw in Father Dinga an opportunity to have another native son of the Diocese and Armstrong County return there to guide his native flock.

"(Bishop Kulick) said he underestimated how special it was for us ... to have a bishop that is from the area, having grown up in the area, and serving his priesthood entirely within the Diocese," Father Dinga said. "He said he hopes that I would have a similar positive experience like that.

"It's certainly very exciting. I'm certainly looking forward to it; it will be a little bit of an adjustment in a

new role now, coming back to so many people I know."

Father Dinga previously served 2½ years as Pastor of St. John the Evangelist and St. Rose parishes in Latrobe

He said he and his family — parents Thomas and Jackie Dinga and siblings Tara and Troy — knew early on that he had a calling to serve God.

They attended the former Holy Trinity Parish in Ford City, which was merged with the former St. Francis and St. Mary parishes to become Christ, Prince of Peace Parish. As a child, Father Dinga said he would point to the parish's tall towers and carvings and tell his family, "I want to go to church."

He said he felt the call to serve God more in junior high school, and he became further involved in the parish in high school.

Father Dinga said he was influenced by Father Bryan F. Summers, former Pastor of the parish, and family friend Father Daniel C. Mahoney, both of whom are retired priests of the Diocese, as well as Father Tyler J. Bandura, former episcopal master of ceremonies for Bishop Edward C. Malesic, who is now Bishop of the Diocese of Cleveland.

Father Bandura, now director of the Office for Priestly Vocations, is also from Ford City, and was ordained a priest two years before Father Dinga in 2013.

Father Dinga said the community and parish were very supportive of his path to the priesthood, adding that they saw the calling in him as well.

"Having several priestly vocations come from Ford City with Father Tyler Bandura and (seminarian) Andrew Hamilton, (Bishop Kulick) said, in a sense, this is showing people that, as an answer to their prayers, here is one of (their native sons) being sent back to them to serve them," he said.

Father Dinga attended Gannon University and St. Mark Seminary, both in Erie, from 2007-11, followed by St. Mary's Seminary & University, Baltimore, Md., from 2011-15.

He was ordained to the priesthood June 20, 2015, at Blessed Sacrament Cathedral, Greensburg.

After his ordination, he served as Parochial Vicar at Our Lady of Grace Parish, Greensburg, and St. Benedict Parish, Marguerite, as well as cochaplain of Clelian Heights School for Exceptional Children, Greensburg, until June 2016. He then served as Parochial Vicar of Mother of Sorrows Parish, Murrysville, before serving in Latrobe.

As he begins his new duties as the faithful are coming back from the COVID-19 pandemic, Father Dinga said it is important to rekindle their faith and also bring back those who have gone elsewhere to worship or who have fallen away altogether.

"To be having someone that they know already, in a sense, be leading them, it will be less time to have them get to know me. It will be less time to hit the ground running, and not as much of a learning curve," he said. "I'm very grateful for this opportunity."

Musical success story returns to present gift to GCC

GREENSBURG — Johnathan Pushkar's face was absolutely beaming as he returned to Greensburg Central Catholic Junior-Senior High School June 9.

There were many reasons for the 2014 GCC alumnus to feel that way. He was back home for a few days, and while he was home he presented his alma mater with a commemorative framed vinyl copy of his new album -"Compositions."

"It definitely is an interesting feeling," Pushkar said. "It's hard to put into words."

While he may have had problems putting his feelings into words that day, Pushkar has not had a hard time putting his musical passion into words.

He wrote or co-wrote 10 of the 11 songs on "Compositions."

Pushkar, 25, a North Huntingdon native, has lived in Nashville, Tenn. since he attended Belmont University.

"I just kind of planted my roots there and stayed," Pushkar said. "I wanted to do something in the music business, so I took the adventure. I went to Nashville and I stayed."

His passion for music began when he was a student at GCC, where he played in the jazz band. He also played drums in a local Beatles tribute band called the Abbey

Roadsters — a la Ringo Starr.

"Just getting to exercise those muscles and getting to grow as a young man and as a musician, it was really here that I knew it was the path I wanted to take," Pushkar said.

That's why he felt it was so important to present the commemorative vinyl to his alma mater.

Pushkar recalled sitting in biology class during his sophomore year when an idea for a song called "Smile" popped into his head.

"It was one of those moments where I started writing down the words, and I'm humming the melody in

my iPod touch on the way home. I got home and wrote it, and the whole thing came together just like that," he said. "That was the first time that I thought maybe this could be something someday. I really learned to believe in myself and developed thick skin and was able to figure out the kind of force I want to be in the world, both academically and of course musically."

"Smile" appears on Pushkar's first album, "Straighten Up," which was released in 2019.

Joette Salandro, Pushkar's music teacher at GCC, said she saw Pushkar's creativity,

enthusiasm and passion for

"It's wonderful," Salandro said. "That's why you teach. To see your students move on and fulfill their dreams. He certainly is doing that."

Pushkar describes his music as "very rooted in '50s and '60s rock 'n' roll."

"I like to say if you made a perfect triangle of Buddy Holly, the Beach Boys and Beatles and Tom Petty, I'd land somewhere in the middle," he said, adding that he plays a 12-string guitar, which is his go-to instrument for the album.

The song Pushkar did

not write or co-write on "Compositions" is called "Junior's Farm," a remake of a song by Paul McCartney and Wings.

The McCartney connection does not end there. Geoff Britton, McCartney's drummer, is featured on four songs on the album, including "Junior's Farm."

"He's only recorded it twice, once with Paul McCartney and once with me." Pushkar said. "It's a very cool club to be in."

The video for "Junior's Farm" includes rare archival photos of Paul McCartney and Wings in Nashville.

Another song on the album, "Any Second Now," features drummer Sandy Gennaro, who formerly played with Cyndi Lauper, Joan Jett and the Monkees.

"Compositions" is available online anywhere music is sold and at johnathanpushkar.com.

While home, Pushkar played at the Hard Rock Café in Pittsburgh.

His future plans include a third album with more samplings of the music that has influenced him.

"It's just awesome to be back," Pushkar said. "I try to get back to Pennsylvania two or three times a year. It's always great to reconnect. But it's not every day you get an awesome reason like this to come back to the old stomping grounds. I hope someday there is a kid who was like me and gets to see that album, and I hope it inspires another kid just like me down the line."
