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

Monsignor John A. Regoli

Monsignor John A. Regoli, a retired priest of the Diocese of Greensburg, died April 28, 2023, at St. Anne Home. He was 87.

Born in New Kensington, Oct. 22, 1935, he was a son of the late Bruno and Louise (Rivi) Regoli. He was ordained a priest May 21, 1961, at

Josephinum Chapel, Columbus, Ohio.

Monsignor Regoli served at St. John the Baptist Parish, Scottdale; Seton Hill University, Greensburg; Holy Family Parish, Latrobe; St. Matthew Parish, Saltsburg; St. Mary Parish, Yatesboro, and its former mission, St. Gabriel, Nu Mine; St. Barbara Parish, Harrison City; St. Therese, Little Flower of Jesus Parish, Uniontown; Holy Family Parish, West



Newton; and the former St. Charles Borromeo Parish, Sutersville.

In 2005, he was named Prelate of Honor to His Holiness, the second highest rank of Monsignor.

He retired in 2006 but continued to visit parishes around the Diocese, celebrating Mass wherever

needed.

He was an official for the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA) and a PIAA and Pennsylvania American Legion baseball umpire.

Diocesan Eucharistic Congress designed to inspire

GREENSBURG — More than 400 Diocesan employees, clergy and religious attended the Diocese of Greensburg's first Eucharistic Congress at Christ Our Shepherd Center, a four-day event designed to provide parish leaders, educators and evangelization professionals with inspiration, ideas and tools to bring Eucharistic Revival to their parish communities. The event was held May 8-11 at Christ Our Shepherd Center.

The Diocese is in year one of a three-year process initiated by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). During this first year, the faithful have been invited to reflect upon the mystery and meaning of the sacrament of the Eucharist in our lives through various Diocesan initiatives.

The Congress was one of numerous informational and devotional opportunities offered by the Diocese, such as the "Know Him" series. The main event of the three-year process will be the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, Ind., in July 2024.

Vincent Reilly, Managing Director of Faith, Family and Discipleship for the Diocese of Greensburg, said he believes the first-ever Congress in the Diocese gave attendees the resources to strengthen parish liturgical life through faithful celebration of the Mass, Eucharistic adoration, missions, resources, preaching and the organic movements of the Holy Spirit.

"We really had a top-notch caliber of speakers coming in from around the country," Reilly said about Bishop Michael G. Woost, Auxiliary Bishop of the Diocese of Cleveland, and Dr. Tim O'Malley, from Notre Dame's McGrath Institute for Church Life. Bishop Woost's topic was "Revealing the Presence of Christ in the Eucharist to All People." O'Malley spoke about "Becoming Eucharistic People."

Workshop sessions included attracting young people back to Mass and showing a Eucharistic spirit for front-line Church workers.

Reilly said it was important during the Congress to provide examples of good Eucharistic celebrations that parishes could emulate.

In addition to Eucharistic adoration and Mass, Bishop Larry J. Kulick led a Eucharistic procession on the center's grounds.

"People were able to experience the procession, the Eucharistic adoration and various Masses as examples of good liturgy that could be done in any parish," Reilly said.

"I would like to see every parish in our Diocese implement one or two of the ideas that came out of the Congress. If each parish does one or two things that was suggested at the Congress, we will create a beautiful mosaic of witnessing our commitment to the presence of the Lord in the Eucharist through our service to the wider community."

Rome gathering fosters education and growth for Eucharistic Revival

The Diocese of Greensburg is blessed to have two members of the Mathis Liturgical Leadership program at Notre Dame University within the Diocese: Vincent Reilly, Managing Director of Faith, Family and Discipleship, and

Dr. Thomas Octave, Diocesan Director of Sacred Music, are among the 20 members of the two-year program that focuses on the opportunity for education and growth in areas around major pastoral issues fronting the Church.

Reilly attended a meeting of the group in Rome, Italy, in May and June, where they discussed resources and materials that can be used throughout the country to promote the Eucharistic Revival and the revival of the Church while immersed in the city's history and theology. Reilly and his counterparts from around the United States worked to develop ways to bring Eucharistic Revival back to parishes here in the Diocese and across the

country.

"Each person has a unique view of the ways of the Church and how we can bring the Eucharistic Revival to life," Reilly said. "All of the information gleaned from this trip will be built out over the next year and a half with methods of forming people in the Eucharistic life in the church."

Reilly kept a daily blog to keep the faithful of the Diocese of Greensburg up to date on the significance of the various places the group visited and how those sites translate to the Eucharistic Revival. See his blog, Eucharistic Revival: Destination Rome, at theaccentonline.org.

Diocese to participate in 2024 National Eucharistic Congress

In July 2024, 80,000 Catholics from around the country will gather in Indianapolis, Ind., for the National Eucharistic Congress, including faithful from the Diocese of Greensburg. One hundred spots have been reserved for those who would like to participate.

Vincent Reilly, Managing Director of Faith, Family and Discipleship, said the focus of the national Congress is to form missionary disciples who will bring back their experiences to their parishes and communities.

"For our Diocese, the hope is for this Congress to coincide with our pastoral plan of forming Eucharistic people," Reilly said. "People who are living life joyfully, regular Catholics who are able to celebrate and live their faith not just at Mass on Sunday, but in their acts of service in their communities, in the way that they raise their families, and care for the church going forward."

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN CHRIST,

I am pleased to present to you the Diocese of Greensburg Strategic Plan, which is a result of a year-long effort of prayer, study, and consultation that I pray will put us on the path to a blessed future!

Since becoming your Bishop, I have been humbled by the willingness of so many of the faithful to serve the Church, especially during a time of great hardship. I was ordained and installed as the Sixth Bishop of the Diocese of Greensburg in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, a time like no other in history. Still, the dedication to so many mission-critical ministries and unselfish service in caring for people in need continued. You have my enduring gratitude.

As we emerge from the pandemic, it has become increasingly clear that the Diocese of Greensburg has experienced a tremendous amount of change. While the pandemic provided us the opportunity to invest in many technological advances to stream liturgies and stay connected on social media with the faithful, we have become accustomed to a new, virtual reality in which technology oftentimes replaces in-person interactions. But nothing will ever replace the experience of worship at which bread and wine are consecrated and shared in the gift of the Eucharist. Unfortunately, many have not returned to the pews or maintained personal connections to their parish.

A nationwide decline in post-pandemic Mass attendance is just one of the so-called "math problems" we face. The number of active native-born clergy is expected to decline significantly in the next eight years, going from 37 to just 15. The shrinking population of Western Pennsylvania is staggering. Westmoreland County has the highest number of natural deaths in the state. The county is losing 2,000 people per year. Our other counties have had significant population loss as recorded in the last census (2010-2020): Armstrong -6% (4,000 people), Fayette -7.6% (9,675 people), and Indiana County -7.2% (6,000 people). The number of Catholic funerals in the four counties of the Diocese last year was 2,100 while the number of baptisms was only 760. Our overall number of parishioners decreased in 2021 by 4% or 4,720 people.

Yet, I still have great hope for our Diocese. Together we have the opportunity to create a more Eucharistic community devoted to loving and serving one another and forming Disciples of Christ. Never in the history of humankind have we been blessed with the current resources and technologies to strengthen enduring and viable faith communities that are filled with the Holy Spirit. The statistics I give above paint only part of the picture. I am confident that, together with the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, we can create a masterpiece for God and our local Church. We must believe in the power of prayer and hard work. What this strategic plan proposes will help us to accomplish great things for the glory of God.

This is a critical moment in the history of our diocese. Let us open our hearts and hands to the Holy Spirit, and work to create an enduring, viable faith community filled with vitality. I am excited to present this plan to you, which will serve as a means of achieving the important goals we set forth to accomplish together.

I hope you will join me in prayer and support of these initiatives. Please be assured you are in my prayers!

STRATEGIC PLAN 2022-2027



Bishop Larry J. Kulick, alongside the Diocese of Greensburg Strategic Planning Committee, developed five major strategic priorities, set forth goals and objectives for each of those priories and defined the mission, vision and values of the Diocese of Greensburg. Over the next five years, this Strategic Plan should provide the operational framework for creation of an enduring, viable faith community filled with vitality.

The process began in the January of 2022, with the preparation of a situation analysis, details of which are included in Bishop Kulick's introductory letter. They concern the current state of the Diocese, including Mass attendance, priestly vocations, population and parish statistics including baptisms and funerals. The purpose of the situation analysis, which was presented to the Bishop's Curia, was to quantify the internal and external challenges facing our faith community.

In February of 2022, Bishop Kulick launched a massive effort to gather quantitative and qualitative data from across the Diocese. The "Synodal Process" as directed by our Holy Father Pope Francis gave the Diocese an opportunity to hold 18 town hall listening sessions involving more than 1,000 people, administer two major surveys which gathered input from more than 13,000 people, and conduct a one year study with surveys and listening sessions regarding faith formation in the Diocese.







On June 22 and 23, 2022, Bishop Kulick assembled the Strategic Planning Committee of the Diocese of Greensburg. The group utilized the situation analysis and the synodal input to develop mission-driven goals, key performance indicators, stakeholder visions, internal process changes and intellectual capital needs for the following areas:

- Evangelization and Catechesis
- Catholic Charities Operations Plan
- Clergy Formation
- Development and Fundraising
- Priestly Vocations
- Pro-Life Advocacy

1 TRANSMITTING THE FAITH

GOAL

Be a more welcoming, engaging Church.

OBJECTIVE 1

Evaluate the new-parishioner experience, from the first phone call to the first person they see as they enter the church to the first time they sit in the pew.

Connect to more people through the use of technology (websites, social media and CCTV).

OBJECTIVE 3

Use multi-platform communication and enhanced catechesis to reach and resonate with all parishioners.

The continuity and consistency of the responses during the synodal process should be noted; from nearly 1,000 individuals who attended the in-person and virtual listening sessions, many expressed a need to focus on transmitting the faith through enhanced catechesis and evangelization. Almost all participants have a great desire to pass on the faith and a sincere interest to help but are not sure how they can be of assistance. Many also expressed concern about fulfilling the legacy of our faith, fearful about how we will fill our pews with the next generation of disciples. Another point conveyed by many participants was the need for pastoral care of parents and grandparents whose children have already left the Church.

Nearly 10,000 paper and electronic surveys were aggregated from across the Diocese

of Greensburg, from parishioners, clergy, religious orders and young people. The surveys revealed that more than 80% of respondents feel very connected to their faith because of the communication they receive from their parishes about opportunities to engage in parish life. This is likely a positive result of COVID-19, when the shutdown necessitated a new model of communication. Many parishes began social media pages, created e-mail databases, and used video to share Mass and spiritual messages with their congregations.

More listening sessions, consistent pulse surveying, listening to the voice of parishioners and communicating to them with new and innovative evangelization and catechesis will become important tactics for transmitting the faith.

2 CREATING PARISH VITALITY

GOAL

Regionalize outreach efforts to create viable parishes filled with vitality.

OBJECTIVE 1

Prioritize efforts that promote vocations.

OBJECTIVE 2


Offer ongoing and inspiring clergy formation opportunities for all priests and deacons, especially international clergy.

OBJECTIVE 3

Create strong pastoral and finance councils, develop strong lay leaders, and attract new volunteers to serve parishes.

Much of the discussion during the synodal listening sessions focused on the "math problem" in the Diocese of Greensburg – mainly that the number of native-born priests in the Diocese of Greensburg is expected to shrink from about 37 to 15 in the next 8 years.

There is great concern about vocations and the engagement of young people. Most participants believe youth and young adults will respond to mission-oriented parish work, as well as creative and new evangelization and faith formation. There was a call from many for family-oriented catechesis, youth-focused Masses, retreats and social activities to make the parish the center of spiritual life for families so that parents will prioritize involvement. The assistance of welltrained lay leaders was viewed as a necessity so that priests can focus on the sacramental needs of the parish. Regionalization of resources could be an effective tool in assisting smaller parishes to deliver the catechesis and ministries if they are willing to enter into collaborative agreements.



IN PARISH ASSIGNMENTS



The need for ongoing clergy formation opportunities was clear during the clergy listening sessions, which called for additional assimilation assistance specifically for international clergy. Specific needs were also revealed in a pastoral connectivity survey taken by more than 10,000 individuals throughout the Diocese of Greensburg:

- 1. I can explain the mission of the Church to others. *43% said yes, definitely.*
- 2. I leave Mass feeling spiritually fed. **68% said yes, definitely.**
- 3. My parish is sensitive to the major needs of parishioners. **58% said yes, definitely.**
- 4. The music at Mass helps me enter into a prayerful attitude. 65% said yes, definitely.
- 5. The homilies at Mass are relevant and meaningful. *67% said yes, definitely.*
- 6. The money spent by my parish reflects its commitment to the mission of the Church. *57% said yes, definitely.*
- 7. The religious education at my parish is forming well-rounded disciples. **45% said yes, definitely.**
- 8. My parish communicates with me about opportunities for worship and service. **81% said yes, definitely.**
- 9. I feel that my parish welcomes my ideas and participation. *52% said yes, definitely.*
- 10. I feel that I am an integral part of the parish community. **50% said yes, definitely.**
- 11. I participate in activities of my parish beyond Mass attendance. *43% said yes, definitely.*
- 12. The Church is a visible, integral part of my neighborhood and the larger community. *59% said yes, definitely.*
- 13. The Church reaches out to those who feel disenfranchised. *37% said yes, definitely.*

The Synod Committee of the Diocese of Greensburg organized an event to engage active pastoral and finance councils throughout the Diocese of Greensburg. On Feb. 6, 2022, pastoral and finance council members from 10 parishes were invited to Mass and brunch with Bishop Kulick, and 92 attended.

Most councils believe they are successful because of the diversity of talents around the table. They value transparency, parishioner and pastor input, and the ability to listen to one another. Many of the councils thought it was important to clearly communicate the "state" of the parish yearly, by providing a written or electronic report to ensure parishioners are aware of the opportunities and challenges facing each parish. All stressed the need for new, younger members who can bring valuable insight to the parish mission and activities.

3 HEARING HIS CALL

GOAL

Call people to action.

OBJECTIVE 1

Prioritize Eucharistic Revival efforts from the inside out, providing the best experiences the Church has to offer.

OBJECTIVE 2

Empower the next generation of Christ's disciples to lead.

OBJECTIVE 3

Encourage stewardship by connecting to parishioners in new ways.

Eucharistic Revival is a three-year process initiated by the USCCB to invite the faithful to reflect upon the mystery and meaning of the sacrament of the Eucharist in our lives. The goal is to create a more Eucharistic Community devoted to loving and serving one another, and forming Disciples of Christ. As Catholics, we are both blessed and broken. His Real Presence in the Eucharistic can transform our hearts. Jesus left us this gift! In a world that is so hurried, we must all slow down, do a deep dive and reflect upon it.

The Diocese is also working on a plan for a series of "Know Him" Gatherings. These experiential evangelization events will help us all grow closer to Christ by learning about his life and the lessons He taught the world. We are working to create short but engaging events that include speakers, multimedia content, witness testimony and interactive activities for the "Know Him" series to be held at Christ Our Shepherd Center. The events are specifically designed for Diocesan and parish staff members, but will be open to public registration as well.

Our efforts will begin from the inside out, first offering formational and devotional opportunities for staff throughout 2023 culminating with a Eucharistic Congress in 2023. After that, we hope they are better prepared to help create a more Eucharistic Community; founding new and innovative ministries focused on re-connecting to the disenfranchised and creating experiential evangelization opportunities that interest and engage our young people. One-to-one personal invitations will be an important part of the process.

One-to-one personal invitations are also an important part of encouraging stewardship. Strategic hires including a Managing Director of Development and a Director of the Catholic Foundation will reinvigorate efforts surrounding planned giving, seminarian and clergy formation support, EITC funding and Bishop's Circle participation.

It is also important to note the many opportunities Bishop Kulick has pursued to re-engage sectors of the faithful throughout the Diocese of Greensburg. Through pastoral visits and personal outreach.

- **YOUTH:** Only about half of respondents under the age of 18 believe that music during Mass and homilies is engaging. And only 43% feel they are an integral part of the Church.
- **FALLEN AWAY CATHOLICS:** Of the respondents who no longer feel connected to the Church, most cannot explain the mission and do not feel they are an integral part of the Church.
- PRACTICING CATHOLICS: Those who attend Mass regularly feel we are caring for their needs but do not feel the Church is doing enough for the disenfranchised.
- **THOSE WHO WANT TO HELP:** Many expressed a willingness to help but are not sure what they can do and disagree about parish consolidation and opportunities to share resources.
- **OTHER ISSUES:** There were pockets of discourse surrounding the Celebration of The Extraordinary Form of the Mass, the environment and the church's stance on same sex marriage.

4 WALKING IN FAITH

GOAL

Walk with parishioners.

OBJECTIVE 1

Continuously evaluate the needs of the faithful and respond to them.

OBJECTIVE 2

Develop more engaging faith formation.

OBJECTIVE 3

Better communicate the resources provided by the Church.

Most of the attendees of the listening sessions belonged to a parish and could identify the mission of the Church. However, almost all were concerned about the next generation of Catholics feeling disconnected from the mission or not even really understanding it. In most cases, participants emphasized the need for more creative, engaging faith formation and opportunities for adult formation, devotion and well-celebrated liturgies that touch the hearts and minds of parishioners. Often, it was said, parishioners need to experience the presence of the Holy Spirit. There was also a call for a clear, united voice from the Church on its teachings.

Parishioners listed many impactful ministries at their parishes like bereavement, poverty relief, homebound and senior care ministries, and pro-life advocacy. Some recognized the need for more service opportunities to better engage younger Catholics. Many expressed a need for an evangelization ministry to reach the unaffiliated or outreach missions to those who have left the Church. There were countless parents and grandparents who expressed a deep hurt over their children leaving the Church and asked for spiritual guidance. Almost all who participated were willing to help with new evangelization and spiritual outreach but are asking for guidance on what exactly they should be doing.

The Diocese of Greensburg will continue to use an integrated approach to gather input from across the region from as many individuals as possible over the next five years. The Diocese has taken seriously the call from our Holy Father to create a more Synodal Church. We will continue to implement listening sessions, continue to gather input, and continue looking for opportunities to evangelize.

An example of that process was a year-long faith formation study in the Diocese of Greensburg called "Christ Is the Truth," in which listening sessions were conducted and surveys distributed in order to discover the thoughts and needs of those most directly involved with providing faith formation throughout the Diocese. Input regarding the whole area of Faith Formation was gleaned from the Synodal listening sessions as well.

Much of the feedback we received centered on the need for creative catechesis programming, collaboration among parishes, schools and facilitating dynamic encounters with Christ. A strategic hire of an individual is needed who has demonstrated success in creating and executing pastoral plans that engage entire families using various forms of faith formation.

The listening sessions and the surveys supported the need for enhanced catechetical offerings, communication, collaboration and outreach in and among the parishes in the Diocese of Greensburg. The fulfillment of many of these needs will help the leaders of our parishes to bring Christ to the people.

5 BUILDING CONNECTIVITY

GOAL

Focus on the less connected.

OBJECTIVE 1

Empower Catholic Charities to assist the poor and energize Catholic schools to create new disciples.

OBJECTIVE 2

Adopt technology tools to help us better know our parishioners and who we have lost and how we can better connect with them.

OBJECTIVE 3

Implement new communication mediums realizing the internet is now the front door to our Church.

OBJECTIVE 4

Continue to prioritize the safety of youth and volunteer adults.

Data plays an important role in this strategic pillar. The Diocese must optimize parishioner relationship management tools and encourage parishes to invest time and resources into their databases. These technology tools will help us know better who we are serving and who we are not. By aggregating that data, major outreach ministries can begin, bridges can be built and those who have left can once again be invited to rejoin our faith community.

Yearly data about website and social media traffic will help us to determine who is searching for us and why. Our front door to the faith community is both relational and virtual, so we must make sure we are on the cutting edge of connectivity.

In the fall of 2021, and as part of both the Synodal and strategic planning processes for Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Greensburg, a survey of stakeholders regarding the pressing needs of our community was sent to staff, volunteers, clergy and parishioners. Catholic Charities received 3,000 responses from across the four counties of the Diocese. The results are as follows:

According to the youth and young adult survey, Catholic Schools are critical to the formation of disciples:

Nearly 1,200 parishioners under the age of 30 participated (about 12% of total respondents) in the pastoral connectivity survey as part of the Synodal process. The sample size by parish was not statistically relevant, and would have a large margin of error if broken down by parish. In aggregate, you can see the percentages of participants who answered "yes" as compared to the larger sample size of parishioners to each question.

Here are some responses of note:

- Only about half of respondents under the age of 18 believe the music at Mass in engaging.
- Only about half of respondents under the age of 18 believe homilies are engaging and meaningful.
 About 83% of respondents under the age of 18 feel their ideas and input are welcome at their parish, but only 43% feel they are an integral part of their faith community.
- Overall, 80% of total survey respondents believe their parish communicates with them about opportunities for worship
 Parishipper's survey responses indicate, for the most part, they feel cared for by their parish, but heliaya the Church.
- Parishioner's survey responses indicate, for the most part, they feel cared for by their parish, but believe the Church
 as a whole is not doing enough for the disenfranchised.
- We received about 1,500 responses from a survey alert postcard mailed to individuals who have not donated to their parish in the last five years. Most could not explain the mission of the Church and do not feel they are integral part of their faith community.

Regarding the protection of children and vulnerable adults, Bishop Kulick has said publically that he will work tirelessly with all key collaborators and advisory bodies to continue to follow the Diocesan Policies put in place by his predecessors as well as monitor the best ways possible to bring reconciliation and healing to those effected by these actions. This includes monitoring and updating as necessary our safe environment policies and regulations to continue to ensure that our parishes, schools, and organizations are the safest places for our children, youth and vulnerable adults.

Planned giving aids Diocese in doing God's work

GREENSBURG — The 2023 Diocesan Lenten Appeal, One Body in Christ, has raised a record \$5.7 million, which is \$350,000 more than last year.

Participation from the faithful in the Diocese of Greensburg is higher, and the average amount of individual gifts is nearly 8% higher than in 2022.

"The results are remarkable," said Paul Puleo, Managing Director of Development for the Diocese. "Almost all of our parishes across the four counties reached their Diocesan targets to support our ministries, such as our International Priest Program, faith formation and to support the economically disadvantaged and those in need who are supported through Catholic Charities." Parishioners are able to continue to donate to the DLA through the end of the year through the envelopes that were mailed to homes, through their parish, or securely online at DioceseofGreensburg.org/OneBody. Puleo said nearly 35 parishes have exceeded their individual goals. Currently, more than \$2 million of the pledged funds will be returned to those parishes for a number of projects to upgrade parish grounds or make repairs and increase ministry outreach programs.

St. Mary, Mother of God Parish, Freeport, had a multiple-year goal to renovate its 150-year-old stained glass windows. The project cost is \$500,000; this year, parishioners have raised over \$200,000.

"Under the leadership of Jeff Polana, this project has been made possible because of the beautiful generosity of the people of St. Mary's," said Monsignor Gilbert C. Gente, Pastor. Polana is the parish's DLA chairperson.

The window restoration is scheduled to be completed by 2026 when the parish will celebrate 200 years of its founding.

Monsignor Gente said the parish also is using \$30,000 for new ministry programs.

St. Martin Parish, New Derry, is also planning a stained glass window renovation, along with other exterior windows.

Father Anthony Onoko, Pastor of St. Raymond of the Mountains Parish, Donegal, said the parish is using DLA funding to eliminate the parish debt, which reached a high of over \$200,000 in January 2021, and for new carpeting and other renovations.

Many parishes are able to make critical infrastructure upgrades. Holy Trinity Parish, Ligonier, is working on a plan to replace its boiler with funds raised this year and last year.

Father Elmer Alforque,
Administrator of the partner
parishes of St. John the Baptist
Parish, Scottdale, and St. Joseph
Parish, Everson, said the parish
share of the DLA campaign will be
used to complete a two-year project
to bring air conditioning to St. John
the Baptist Parish and complete
sidewalk repairs and exterior
upgrades at St. Joseph Parish,
which will include new lighting.

"There is a generous spirit at work here at the partner parishes of St. John the Baptist and St. Joseph," Father Alforque said. "We are truly blessed by our parishioners' continued generosity."

With the additional funding, many parishes are adding security



enhancements, landscaping or upgrading technology. At St. James Parish, New Alexandria, Father Tyler J. Bandura, Pastor, is planning flooring work, pew restoration and cushions, new kneelers, altar furniture refinishing, lighting upgrades and a new social hall entrance.

"We are incredibly grateful to

the nearly 16,000 parishioners across the Diocese who have supported the 2023 DLA campaign," Puleo said. "Their generosity assists the mission of strengthening the Body of Christ in our Diocesan church and in our parishes, enabling us to continue to carry the message of Christ into the world."

Catholic Charities welcoming Ukrainians

GREENSBURG — Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Greensburg is working to welcome Ukrainian families displaced by the war to live, work and worship in Westmoreland County.

Individuals can register for a visit and tour to learn more about opportunities available in Westmoreland County.
Catholic Charities is providing free travel, meals and hotel accommodations to those who qualify. The Westmoreland County Economic Growth Connection (EGC), alongside General Carbide, is assisting with these efforts.

Bishop Larry J. Kulick said the Diocese worked with the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Philadelphia as part of a Catholic mission to provide for the spiritual and physical needs of those impacted by the war in Ukraine.

"Simultaneously, we were approached by community and business leaders who told us they would help sustain our mission by providing employment opportunities and even on-site job interviews when individuals come to visit," the Bishop said.

Business leaders like Mona Pappafava, CEO of General Carbide, are eager for a chance to help with the visit.

"Not only is this a charitable outreach, but it is also a way to connect individuals who want to work with the many opportunities available in Westmoreland County. The labor shortage in this area is no secret. We are excited about the opportunity, even on a small scale, to have an influx of potential candidates," Pappafava said.

The Diocese has created

a bilingual website with visit and registration information at DioceseofGreensburg.org/ WelcometoWestmoreland that includes photos, videos and links for Ukrainians to learn more about Westmoreland County. On it, Father Oleh Seremchuk, a native of Ukraine and Pastor of St. John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Church in Scottdale and St. Nicholas Byzantine Catholic Church in Perryopolis, speaks directly to Ukrainians about the potential of a life in Western Pennsylvania.

The EGC recognized immediately that the existing Ukrainian population in Western Pennsylvania could be a gateway to the next wave of Ukrainian immigration.

"There's no doubt this could help us to build a connection for many of the businesses in our community," said Jim Smith, President and CEO of the EGC, a private, nonprofit economic development corporation. "I've had employers tell me that they are ready and willing to hire individuals who may not necessarily have all the requisite skills but are willing to be trained. Having more diverse channels and a wider reach for recruiting talent is a responsive strategy and one we will hope will work."

Mark Smail of Smail Automotive agrees.

"Many talented individuals have had to flee Ukraine and are pursuing opportunities elsewhere around the country, and there are no shortages of opportunities in Westmoreland County. Hopefully the business community can take an active role in the multitude of opportunities here," he said.



Power of prayer, Father Moineau's clean bill of health celebrated at 'Taste of Louisiana' dinner

EXPORT — Father John A. Moineau beat stage 4 pancreatic cancer. After being diagnosed in July 2021, he received aggressive cancer treatments directed by physicians at Hillman Cancer Center at UPMC East for more than a year.

For his oncologist, Dr. Nishant Tageja, the unlikely outcome of those treatments has reinforced his belief in the power of prayer.

"There was a large pancreatic mass in the head of the pancreas, which is considered to be incurable. Not only did he do very well on treatment, none of our staff can remember him ever complaining of any side effects, which in itself is a miracle," Dr. Tageja said. "At every subsequent scan, the cancer continued to shrink, until a PET scan was performed a year into his treatment which showed absolutely no cancer activity."

Tageja was invited to speak about the success of Father Moineau's treatment at "A Taste of Louisiana," a dinner celebration June 28.

The dinner was prepared by Chef John Folse, known as "Louisiana's Culinary Ambassador to the World," after appearing on international television and radio, writing 10 books and helping to found a culinary institute. In fact, he was the first non-Italian chef to create a Vatican State Dinner in Rome and opened a Cajunstyle restaurant in Moscow's World Trade Center during the Presidential Summit between Ronald Reagan and Mikhail Gorbachev.

Folse came to Westmoreland Country Club, Export, to celebrate Father Moineau's recovery and to cook up a fundraiser with club chef Mark Henry for Queen of Angels Catholic School, North Huntingdon.

The five-course dinner included andouille sausage gumbo and trout with lobster sauce flown in from



Louisiana the morning of the event. The event raised a staggering \$215,000.

Folse has been following Father Moineau's cancer journey on social media from the very beginning.

Father Moineau is pastor of Immaculate Conception Parish, Irwin, and St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Parish, North Huntingdon, and serves on the board of pastors for Queen of Angels Catholic School. He stayed connected with parishioners during the COVID-19 lockdown with weekly YouTube videos and inspired many to return to Mass as the pandemic subsided. He used social media to announce his diagnosis, provide health updates and share the news about his miraculous recovery.

Many of his YouTube viewers decided to attend the dinner.

"I was overwhelmed by the diagnosis. And then I was overwhelmed by the support of my family and friends and the immediate response of prayer by my parishioners and the children at Queen of Angels," Father Moineau told the crowd. "And then I was overwhelmed with divine favor in the miraculous healing of this terminal stage four pancreatic cancer."

When Folse heard the good news, he was elated. He connected with fellow restaurateur Barbara Braun, who co-owned Chesterfield's in North Huntingdon with her late husband, chef Jack Braun. She arranged for the two to meet and develop a concept for a celebration fundraiser.

More than 200 people attended the sold-out event, which Folse promises to repeat again next year.

In making the announcement, Bishop Kulick said Maher will oversee individualized emergency management plans at all 12 Catholic schools and will assist parishes with their safety and security needs.

"In these uncertain times, the safety and security of our students and our parishioners is always a priority," Bishop

Kulick said. "Mr. Maher has served with the State Police in all four counties of our Diocese, and I know he will bring his vast experience of more than 25 years in law enforcement to the Diocese of Greensburg."

The hiring of
Maher is part of a
safety initiative undertaken
by Superintendent of Catholic
Schools Dr. Nancy Rottler.
Dr. Rottler will implement the

initiative this fall in Catholic schools across the Diocese of Greensburg.

"Mr. Maher will be working

with our office to hire more than two dozen school officers who will work alongside each school's administrative team to provide a highly visible presence on every campus throughout the course of each school day and during

designated after-school events and activities," Dr. Rottler said.

"These officers, who will be

a mix of full- and part-time, must be a former employee of an accredited municipal or state law enforcement agency and will report to Mr. Maher," Dr. Rottler added.

Because they will be armed, school officers will be required to maintain their firearms proficiency certification.

Maher, who holds a degree in criminology from Indiana University of Pennsylvania, began his career with the Pennsylvania State Police in 1998. He has attended over 75 classes on such topics as school safety, antiterrorism measures, opioid investigations, active shooter

analysis and response, and sports and special events incident management.

"I believe that a safe and secure environment, provided by professionals, is essential as we build a just and compassionate society," Maher said. "The values that I learned in my time with the State Police — honor, service, integrity, respect, trust, courage and duty — will serve as the foundation of the department I will be building within the Diocese of Greensburg."

Maher is the father of three children and lives in Blairsville.

IRWIN — Scouting has always been a major part of 14-year-old Scotty Clark's life. His father, Scott Clark, was his den leader and is now his scoutmaster, and his late grandfather, Ellsworth "Buddy" Clark, was always there to assist.

When Scotty was 9, his grandfather died, and friends gave him poems and Bible verses to help him deal with his grief. He returned the favor when a friend of his mother, Kimberly, lost her mother and when his cousin's dog died, making cards for them to help soften the blow.

"They really appreciated it. It seemed like the best thing I could do for them. Knowing someone cares about you helps," he said.

Scotty is a parishioner of Immaculate Conception Parish and will be a ninthgrader at Penn Middle School near Jeannette. His siblings, Nicholas and Emily, are also Scouts.

A Scout in Troop 239 in Claridge, Scotty decided that for his Eagle Scout project, he would continue helping people dealing with grief. He constructed a rack for pamphlets about grief that now stands in his parish's cemetery chapel.

He also took on a major initiative to add GPS coordinates in the Find a Grave app to help people find loved

ones buried at the cemetery. He enlisted 35 volunteers to work with him and was able to add coordinates for more than 2,200 graves.

Eucharistic processions mark Feast of Corpus Christi

- Bishop Larry J. Kulick presided at the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) Mass and powerful Eucharistic procession June 11 at the partner parishes of St. John the Baptist, Scottdale, and St. Joseph, Everson.

Bishop Kulick celebrated Mass at St. Joseph Parish, followed by a Eucharistic procession to St. John the Baptist Parish for adoration. Following tradition, an intricately embroidered Eucharistic processional canopy was part of the procession.

"Today's Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) calls us to renew our own selves and our parishes, not only worshipping Christ and taking it out into the world to strengthen others," said Bishop Kulick.

The Eucharist, he said, is

the source and summit of our lives. The procession was part of a three-year Eucharistic Revival process initiated by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) to reflect on the meaning of the Eucharist in our lives. This year, parishes in the Diocese of Greensburg are focusing not only on Diocesan staff, but all parishes.

The bishop said that sometimes American Catholics don't understand relics or processions.

"Liturgically, we do less and less. A procession is an imitation of what we believe," he said.

During his homily, Bishop Kulick said Corpus Christi reminds us that Christ is our source of unity as he calls us into one body, which is the Church, to not only nourish but to be in communion, to be as one united toward the final destination of heaven.

"There are many processions in life and we may get tired, or we might let go and break away from the group. The church reminds



us we are so blessed here in this nation to experience the gift of freedom. The church reminds us we are walking together," he said.



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Young adults, families talk faith around campfire

FORD CITY — More than 50 young adults and many of their children gathered around a campfire in Ford City June 23 to learn more about their faith.

Organized by Katie Tylinski, Director of Faith formation at Christ Prince of Peace and St. Lawrence parishes, the event provided food and fellowship to help build community with young adults 20-45 years of age and their families. The highlight of the evening was a Q&A session with Bishop Larry J. Kulick and newly ordained Father Andrew J. Hamilton.

"It was so wonderful to see our young Church gathered around the campfire to gain insights into our faith by having their questions answered thoroughly," Tylinski said. "We look forward to many other young adult events in the future, and would love to have the Bishop return to an event like this again soon. It is very evident that he loves the young Church. It was also nice to see a variety of young people attending — single, married, families with children and divorced singles from various areas of our Diocese. There is a clear hunger for this ministry."

Although unsuccessful in trying to "Stump the Bishop," the questions submitted were thoughtfully answered by Bishop Kulick and Father Hamilton, and sparked lively discussion. Following are abbreviated answers to some of the questions asked.

Can someone go through purgatory on Earth or just after death? Can our suffering on Earth eliminate or reduce purgatory time?

Bishop Kulick: Purgatory is an opportunity for us, in the after-death experience, to be purged of our sin through God's mercy as part of our

journey into eternity. We believe Jesus rose with his soul and body as one in a glorious state. All of us will live forever and will experience the fullness of the resurrection forever. It is where and how we will experience that resurrected life that we are concerned about. Can we be purified here on Earth? Absolutely. The crosses we carry and the sacrifices we make here on Earth make us stronger and allow us to be more virtuous in our actions.

At baptism we are marked with the sign of the cross. That ontological cross, as well as other changes in your being made through the sacraments, remain with you through eternity, and means that the devil cannot overcome you.

Father Hamilton: Christ's sacrifice on the cross was perfect. We need to participate in that sacrifice as we head to our heavenly realm. My speculation is that when we meet Christ at our judgement, we may feel that we need to be more perfect, and are not ready to participate in His sacrifice. We will have free will to go to purgatory to be cleansed. I don't see it as a punishment, but as a choice.

I feel like I see so much demonic influence in the media; why do you think that is? Do you feel like there are signs indicating the second coming of Christ?

Bishop Kulick: We need to know that the devil and his presence is real. We all have free will and the devil cannot take that away from us. We can choose to allow evil to enter in. Many times, with increased ignorance, a lack of grace and a theologically uneducated laity, we do not realize we are making choices that open the gateway, which allows this to happen. The occult is a huge gateway.

Another gateway is the procurement, assistance or encouragement of an abortion. Is there an increase in evil in the world right now? Think about it, parents are not baptized and are not baptizing their children. Tied to the rite of baptism is the rite of exorcism. Couples are not being married in the Church. These things are prolific in our culture today and we are not receiving the grace of God that is freely given to protect us. Every generation thinks that the second coming is here; even St. Paul in his early writings believed this and



suggested we lead austere lives because he thought the Lord was coming in his lifetime.

I don't venture to go there. But I do say that evil is extremely present today, because we allow it. We don't arm ourselves with the Eucharist or the sacrament of penance and absolution; we live in states of mortal sinfulness. The floodgates are open; how much work does the devil even have to do? It's like a free holiday! It's like giving away the keys to the ice cream truck! These are fertile grounds for the devil.

What is the mark of the evil one? Chaos, confusion, disunity. Rational thought is gone today, objective truth is gone. We are polarized and fragmented. Look at what is happening in our culture: a complete division, turning over

of moral order, objective truth, and now the attack is on the natural being itself. We give the devil all the power he needs."

How do you know whether you are following the Holy Spirit or your own inner wants?

Bishop Kulick: The Holy Spirit is alive, and animates our lives and protects the Church. We need to discern our decisions by incorporating right reason and judgement, an understanding and knowledge learned through Scripture and Church tradition, and inspiration by heroic example. If you come to a decision, based in the spirit of prayer, integrity and respect, the Holy Spirit guides us, and is aligned with our conscience. We must be careful that we are not simply following our emotions.

An idea cannot be of the Holy Spirit if it goes against virtues or the disciplines and teachings of the Church. We are given a recipe for life, and if we follow the recipe, it works. Many times, we don't want to follow the recipe — we want to take a shortcut, make exceptions — and then we get frustrated when it doesn't work out. The gifts of the Holy Spirit never go away, and we can pull on them whenever we need them.

Father Hamilton: A principal of St. Ignatius of Loyola is "Never change your spiritual plan in a time of desolation." When we feel discouragement, we want to quit and make a new plan. The spirit of fortitude, a gift of the Holy Spirit, helps to get us through difficult moments, so that our desires start to align with the desires of God. Having good and wise people around you can also be a great help since we are strongly influenced by our environment.

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


Advertising Business/Marketing Professional of the Year: First Place Jennifer Miele, Chief Communications Officer and Managing Director of Evangelization
