

National pilgrimage energizes faithful in Greensburg

GREENSBURG — It began in May in New Haven, Conn. Groups of young people, clergy and religious began their pilgrimage across the Eastern Seaboard, over the Appalachian Mountains and into Western Pennsylvania.

Members of the pilgrimage's St. Elizabeth Ann Seton route, one of four routes across the United States, are on a mission. Their journey is part of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' three-year National Eucharistic Revival aimed at reviving and energizing the faithful in our Catholic belief in Jesus' real presence in the Eucharist.

Their journey ends July 17-21, when more than 80,000 Catholics, including 100 from the Diocese of Greensburg, are gathering in Indianapolis, Ind., for the 10th National Eucharistic Congress.

For the Elizabeth Ann Seton route, six "perpetual pilgrims" are making the complete journey to Indianapolis. Along the way, they are joined by clergy and religious. They are led by their chaplain, Father Roger Landry, who works for the Holy See's Permanent Observer Mission to the United Nations in New York.

Pilgrims made a stop in the Diocese of Greensburg June 11. The "perpetual pilgrims" and Father Landry, along with clergy and religious from the Diocese of Greensburg, joined Bishop Larry J. Kulick for Mass at Our Lady of Grace Parish, Greensburg. During his homily, Father Landry explained to the more than 250 attending that this Eucharistic procession is so important because it brings all of us in front of the source and summit of our faith, Jesus Christ.

Those attending the Mass were invited to a free Faith and Family Fun Night which featured a bounce house, face painting, balloon making and food trucks. Those in attendance were able to talk with the "perpetual pilgrims" and the clergy and religious traveling with them.

"Perpetual pilgrim" Marina Frattaroli of New York City began the St. Elizabeth Ann Seton route in Connecticut. Frattaroli is new to the Catholic Church, having completed the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults program in 2022. She said she has a passion for showing fellow Catholics what we have in the holy Eucharist and showing those outside the Church the treasure she said they are missing in their lives.

"I set out on this pilgrimage to pray for healing with the hope that it would change the Catholic Church in America," Frattaroli said. "That is happening, but especially for me personally. God has presented ways for my heart to heal as I partake in His body and blood every day. He is drawing me closer to Him like He never has before because He is honoring our sacrifices."

A recent Columbia Law School graduate, Frattaroli is studying for the bar exam while participating in the pilgrimage.

On June 12, the monstrance with the body of Christ processed into Sacred Heart Parish, Jeannette, where Bishop Kulick celebrated Mass for the hundreds in attendance. Following Mass, the Eucharistic procession began through the streets of Jeannette. Clergy from around the area, including Saint Vincent College, Latrobe, religious and the faithful, including many young families, made their way to nearby Ascension Parish, singing hymns and praying along the way. Many standing along the route dropped to their knees in prayer when the procession passed them. Clergy and religious occasionally broke away to visit with people on their porches or the sidewalks.

"They are just so grateful because the Eucharist on this national pilgrimage visited their neighborhood and walked straight by their front porch when they happened to be there," Father Landry said.

Following Benediction at Ascension, an Italian luncheon was held, and then the procession moved on to Immaculate Conception Parish, Irwin.

Darek Herchko, a former parishioner of Immaculate Conception Parish, traveled with his young daughter from their home in Flower Mound,

Texas, to be part of the historic event.

"It's one of the biggest events since I have been alive," Herchko said. "Who knows when I will be able to experience something like this? My daughter, who is 4, might not remember this, but maybe she can tell her children she was part of this in 2024."

At Immaculate Conception Parish, Bishop Kulick presided over a serene time of reflection and prayer during adoration. In his homily, he reminded the hundreds who gathered that we were blessed to have people who are on a journey with Jesus, and they have brought Him to us so that all might also have an encounter with Him.

Bishop Kulick reminded the faithful that the pilgrimage is a way to meet Jesus; however, we meet Him in our everyday life, during our own journeys.

"When you receive Communion, you meet Jesus in the sacraments. When you pray, you meet Jesus. And, if we are a Christian, then our whole life is an encounter, a journey with Jesus. In prayer,

when we go to Mass, when we do good works, when we visit the sick, when we help the poor, when we think of others, when we are not selfish, when we are loving ... in this we always meet Jesus. And the journey of life is the journey to meet Jesus."

Bishop Kulick encouraged the faithful, especially the young Church, to go forward and be brave in their journey of life because Jesus is always with them.

"He will feed you with His body and blood. You are never alone, because God will be your nourishment and your strength."

Following a musical send-off for the pilgrims by the children of Immaculate Conception Parish, those attending were invited to an ice cream social with games for children, who also made chalk drawings with monks and sisters.

Vincent Reilly, Managing Director of Faith, Family and Discipleship, said the twoday pilgrimage here was a celebration of the presence of Jesus and a revival across the Diocese of Greensburg.

He said he hopes the pilgrimage helps the faithful develop a deeper connection with the Lord through the Eucharist in their parishes and with the broader Church.

"A lot of people were excited by seeing religious sisters and religious brothers and seeing young adults give up their summer in order to journey with the Lord," he said. "It was beautiful to see the young Church at all of our events."

Diocese of Greensburg ordains three new priests

GREENSBURG — It has been nearly a decade since the Diocese of Greensburg has ordained more than one priest at a time. On June 1 at Blessed Sacrament Cathedral, Bishop Larry J. Kulick ordained three men to the priesthood: Fathers Craig

Alexander, David Slusarick and John Torres. It was the first time since 2015 that three men have been ordained together in the Diocese.

"I believe that it's not only a beautiful sign of God's blessings to us, but also an answer to our prayers," Bishop Kulick said. "The people of the Diocese have been praying with the intention for vocations. It was a wonderful day of celebration." Bishop Kulick said he was blessed to know each of the priests during their formation through seminary.

"They approach the altar not to be the Savior, but to guide people through the mystery of the Church and on to salvation," Bishop Kulick said. "They approach the altar as the sacrificial Christ who climbed the altar of Calvary. They go to the altar to serve"

Father John Torres, a native of Amparo, Sao Paulo, Brazil, came to the United States to study at Saint Vincent Seminary, Latrobe. Unable to speak or read English, he had nine months to learn and speak the language in order to attend his classes and learn.

"Since the beginning, the people were very nice, understanding and patient," Father Torres said.

Bishop Kulick said Father Torres is a classic model of an immigrant who came to the United States with great determination and tremendous sacrifices and embraced the opportunities our nation offers.

"It is amazing that he was able to do his graduate studies here and actually taught himself how to speak English," Bishop Kulick said. "In his prayer and discernment, he asked the Lord to guide him as to where he should serve. Father Torres said the Lord guided him to Greensburg, where the people are faithful and generous and where priests are needed."

His parents, Antonio and Lucia, traveled from Brazil to attend the ordination. Since 2021, Father Torres served the Catholic Communities of Connellsville and Dunbar as a transitional deacon. His home parish is St. Rita of Cascia Parish, Connellsville.

Endowments ensure future of Church

GREENSBURG — The Catholic Foundation for the Diocese of Greensburg receives many questions about the purpose of an endowment and how it is used to benefit parishes, cemeteries or other Diocesan programs. I hope to answer some of them below.

What is an endowment?

An endowment is a fund that generates revenue to support your parish, cemetery or one of many Diocesan programs such as faith formation, clergy formation, Catholic schools or Catholic Charities. Endowment funds preserve the principal for perpetuity while the earnings from the invested assets are spent per the donor's wishes. Think of an endowment as a retirement account or legacy for the parish or for funding Diocesan ministries. Named endowment funds can be established for a minimum of \$50,000, or gifts can be added to existing funds to grow the principal at any time.

How does an endowment financially support my wishes?

A donor can make gifts to endowed funds with cash or stock or in an estate plan. The Catholic Foundation holds endowed funds perpetually in trust for parishes and other Diocesan ministries. If you created an endowment to support faith formation programs at your parish, your gift would be the principal, which is invested to produce annual income

for the parish. As an example, if a parish has a \$1 million endowment, it would give a parish an estimated \$40,000 in annual income.

The Foundation has over 200 endowments that make up over \$100 million in assets. Besides the parish and cemeteries, endowments support Diocesan pastoral care, Catholic education, Catholic Charities, international priests, lay ministry, vocations, the Office of Faith, Family and Discipleship, and priests' health and retirement costs.

Examples of important Diocesan funds that assist in the mission of our Church are as follows:

Parishes: All parishes in the Diocese have created either a parish or cemetery endowment.

Francis Fund: Supporting the office of Faith, Family and Discipleship, the fund helps parishes provide effective spiritual formation for all age groups, especially our young people.

Priestly Vocations: This supports the education and formation of seminarians for priesthood in the Diocese.

Catholic Charities: This provides ncome to support Catholic Charities programs for families and individuals in the four counties of the Diocese.

St. Joseph, the Carpenter Fund: This provides income to support ordained ministry, including seminarians, the ongoing education of clergy, and the education of permanent deacons

All endowment funds are governed by the guidelines of three components, including a written investment policy, withdrawal policy and usage policy.

Foundation policies The usage policy

The Foundation's usage policy establishes the purposes for which a fund can be used. Endowments, whether set up by an institution or given as a gift by donors, can have multiple uses. These include ensuring financial support of Diocesan ministries or vocations, or providing other financial assistance to parishes and cemeteries.

The investment policy

The Foundation's policy lays out which types of investments a third-party manager is permitted to make and dictates how much risk the manager can take in seeking the target return. The Foundation follows strict investment and screening policies outlined by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.

The withdrawal policy

The withdrawal policy allows parishes to accept income from a fund or reinvest earnings to grow the value of the fund.

The Foundation has a specific annual distribution rate, and annually approves a distribution rate. In the past few years, it has distributed 4%-5% of the 3-year average fair market value of each fund.

Many parishes achieving their combined goals rely on this extra money to support projects and programs that might not otherwise be covered or partially funded in an annual budget.

Kerygma Retreat opens hearts, deepens faith

GREENSBURG — In his recent pastoral letter "Donum Veritatis: The Gift of Truth," Bishop Larry J. Kulick emphasizes his commitment to forming missionary disciples in the Diocese of Greensburg.

He writes, "we will offer discipleship retreats on a regular basis for all people of the Diocese to have this intimate encounter with Jesus, experiencing the proclamation of the Gospel in a clear and powerful way and renewing their participation in the sacraments." (53)

The Kerygma Discipleship Retreat is the implementation of the Bishop's plan to offer these opportunities to the faithful. While this retreat is new to the Diocese, its content is the Good News of Jesus Christ. In fact, "kerygma" is the Greek word for "proclamation" and refers to the Good News that our heavenly Father loves us so much that he sent His son, Jesus, to die and rise again to save us, and that Christ is with us always.

The Diocese held its first Kerygma Discipleship Retreat May 17-19 at Christ Our Shepherd Center, Greensburg. Many of the more than 50 participants described it as an amazing experience.

The Kerygma Discipleship Retreat is the perfect way to encounter and deepen our relationship with Christ in our often hectic lives, according to Vincent Reilly, Managing Director of the Office of Faith, Family and Discipleship.

"This retreat is designed so that all family members in a household can participate at the same time. The retreat is appropriate for everyone age 18 and up, no matter how actively they are practicing their faith or their life experience. It encourages participants to move from 'knowing about Jesus' to 'knowing Jesus' and 'going to Church' to 'being Church," Reilly said.

Kate Parkinson, a Kerygma Discipleship Retreat leader, said the program is rooted in the Good News of Christ.

"The Kerygma Retreat is immersed in Sacred Scripture and the life of the early Church with time for small group discussions and prayer, the opportunity for the sacrament of reconciliation, adoration, the celebration of Mass and fellowship," she said.

Those who participated in the first Kerygma Discipleship Retreat felt its experiential impact.

"I loved it. It was really deep, really enriching, really powerful, and I would encourage anyone, wherever you are in your faith life, to come and do this. It will take you even further than you can imagine," said Vaughn Thomas, a parishioner of St. Barbara Parish, Harrison City.

"I just had a beautiful experience with the Holy Spirit and having my relationship with the Lord grow deeper and more personal. And also, in the Eucharist and in knowing my Catholic faith," said Carolyn Cannizzaro, a parishioner of St. Anne

Parish, Rostraver. "Every person, every Catholic, should experience the love of God on a Kerygma retreat."

"The Kerygma retreat is the most transformative retreat that I've been on. Bishop Kulick memorializes county's unclaimed dead

GREENSBURG — Some of them outlived their loved ones. Others were estranged from their families. Some were cremated more than 30 years ago. On a hillside beyond the boundary of the Westmoreland County Prison, 53 unclaimed remains were laid to rest in a special memorial service presided over by Bishop Larry J. Kulick on June 27.

"One of the corporal works of mercy is to bury our dead," Bishop Kulick told those gathered for the service. "We are doing that today as a fruit of our charity and our discipleship."

Whether a family could not afford to take on the financial responsibility of a proper burial, or if all efforts of tracking down relatives were exhausted, the cremains sat in boxes in an evidence room in the Westmoreland County Coroner's Office.

Coroner Tim Carson was glad that a proper resting place was found for the 53 individuals.

"I think this is an important function of our duties in the Coroner's Office, and I appreciate the support of the community in doing this," Carson said.

Two of the individuals memorialized were veterans. Nolan M. Holliday served in the U.S. Navy during World War II, and Armand M. Bucci served in the U.S. Air Force during the Vietnam War. Members of the American Legion posts throughout Westmoreland County escorted their remains to the National Cemetery of the Alleghenies, where they will receive full military honors.

Joining Bishop Kulick for the ecumenical memorial service were the Reverend David Ackerman, Conference Minister, Penn West Conference of the United Church of Christ, and the Reverend Nick Poole from Calvary Church in Irwin. Each shared a reflection during the memorial service.

Bishop Kulick said the service brought together the community, regardless of political ideology, professional backgrounds or faith traditions. He said the service of commendation is a reminder to live in a way that is honorable, charitable and merciful, and said the memorial service is a beautiful sign of the unity of humanity rooted in faith.

"We see in this action that what we do is not the end. What we believe and what we do here is a sign of hope, a sign of belief in resurrection and of new life."



Scouts recognized at annual Convocation Mass

LATROBE — Bishop Larry J. Kulick exhorted Scouts from the Diocese of Greensburg to cling firmly to their moral principles and use their talents and skills to guide others to the Catholic faith.

Bishop Kulick spoke to Scouts during his homily as he celebrated the annual Diocesan Scout Convocation Mass at St. John the Evangelist Parish April 28.

During the Mass, the Bishop recognized 17 Catholic Scouts from the Diocese who have completed work on their religious emblems in the past year.

Bishop Kulick, who himself earned the rank of Eagle Scout, said the heart of Scouting is sacrificial love, love of God, love of country and love of others.

That love inspires Scouts to serve others as Jesus demonstrated to his disciples on Holy Thursday in the washing of their feet, he said.

"There is a common good that allows us to be people who reflect the goodness of God," he said. "We need to remind ourselves to work for something beyond ourselves.

"Be the beacon. Be witnesses of your beliefs"

Like Bishop Kulick, Chuck Boyer, chair of the Catholic Committee on Scouting for the Diocese of Greensburg, believes Scouting provides a pathway to strengthening faith in Catholic youth.

Boyer said the 12th point of the Scout Law — a Scout is reverent — is vital in helping Catholic Scouts embrace and nurture their faith.

It is the foundation of the other 11 points of the Scout Law, he said.

Scouts honored at the convocation had the opportunity to earn religious emblems and religious activity patches by completing faith-focused activities and projects.

"As parents or guardians, we want

what is best for our kids, not just now but for the future," Boyer said. "We want our kids to grow up to be good citizens and faithful Catholics.

"Catholic Scouting is a time-honored and fun way to support parents' efforts to raise their children to become responsible, well-rounded adults," he said, noting that Catholic Scouting has been a part of the vocation stories of many priests in the Diocese.

"An emphasis on awareness and discernment of vocations is an important part of both the National and Diocesan Catholic Committees on Scouting (DCCS) missions," he said.



Bishop celebrates confirmation in Spanish in Jeannette

JEANNETTE — Eric Joel Loja Guaman traveled further than most — across the globe — to receive the sacrament of confirmation at Sacred Heart Parish, where he's found his home away from home.

Guaman was born in the United States and raised in Ecuador, returning to the U.S. in 2023 when he was 14.

He proudly took the name Joseph after St. Joseph, foster father of Jesus, during his confirmation on Pentecost Sunday before friends and family of the Latino community at Ascension Parish in Jeannette, a place the tight-knit community can be found every Sunday evening at 6 p.m. for the Spanish Mass.

The confirmation Mass was celebrated on Pentecost Sunday by Fr. Christopher J. Pujol.

At the Mass, Bishop Larry J. Kulick reminded parishioners that the Holy Spirit is with us, too, and provides strength and gifts we use in our everyday lives as he confirmed them.

He told those in the Latino community that they always have a home at Ascension Parish and in the Diocese of Greensburg.

"Our heritages are so close. We hope you feel at home in the Diocese of Greensburg," Bishop Kulick said.

Father Christopher J. Pujol, Diocesan Episcopal Master of Ceremonies, celebrated the confirmation Mass in Spanish.

Benedictine Father Job Foote, Parochial Vicar for the partner parishes of Ascension and Sacred Heart, celebrates the weekly Spanish Mass. He relies on those in the Latino community for assistance, like Glenda Winge, a catechist who assisted with the confirmation, and who Father Job introduced as director of religious education for the Latino community. She also manages the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program, though she holds no official title in the parish.

Winge said Father Job knows the language, understands the culture and cares for each member of the community.

"The Latino community from Ascension is very thankful to Father Job for his faithful commitment to weekly Spanish Masses and being part of the convivencia (communal co-existence/potluck) every week, which has contributed to create a tight-knit community," Winge said.

Winge described Guaman as a "humble, reserved, smart and respectful young man."

"During a catechetical presentation and reflection on the spiritual and corporal works of mercy, he shared with his catechist that he and his uncle were part of a missionary group back home," she said. "It wasn't until this recent lesson that he realized he had already done some of the works, not knowing they were called works of mercy."

The two visited underprivileged areas, teaching people about God while helping them with other tasks.

"It wasn't easy, but I learned much about that experience and I really liked it," said Guaman, whose family are parishioners of Ascension Parish.

Winge said the Latino community was honored to have Bishop Kulick celebrate the rite of confirmation, all in Spanish.

"The community was also grateful for the Bishop's heartwarming message and how appreciative he is of the Latino presence in the Diocese," she said. "Gracias, Bishop Kulick."






